### ***Training!***

From September 12 through 23, we were training in yet another village, Gbintiri. It is the third village in two months' time. And this Sunday, October 2, we leave for the fourth village, Bakpaba. It can get exhausting! Teaching, as all teachers know, takes a lot out of you. And doing it in another culture with the help of a translator doesn't make it any easier on us. But this is the reason for which we came to Ghana. And, therefore, we rejoice to be doing the work of the Lord, even if it means we're getting a bit weary!

As in all places, we are blessed to be distributing the Reader's Edition of the Book of Concord. For those of you without much Book of Concord (BOC) experience, the BOC was first presented in 1580 as the definitive collection of our Lutheran confessions. It contains the Augsburg Confession of 1525, the Apology (Defense) of the Augsburg Confession, Luther's Small and Large Catechisms, the Smalcald Articles (a writing by Luther in 1537 expressing his faith in case he died), the Treatise on the Power and the Primacy of the Pope, and the Formula of Concord (a document written in 1577 after Luther's death to lay before the different Lutheran factions what is the definitive Lutheran confession of some disputed articles). In addition, the editors of the BOC also included the three ecumenical creeds – the Apostles', Nicene, and Athanasian – to show that what the Lutheran Church was teaching was nothing new. In fact, the reformers were merely calling the Church back to its original faith, what the early teachers of the faith, the apostles, had contended for all those many years ago.

In the USA, whenever one of our LCMS pastors is ordained, the candidate for ordination swears an oath that he accepts the BOC *because* it is a faithful exposition of the Word of God in the Scriptures. (Other Lutherans only subscribe "in so far as" it agrees with Scripture.) By that oath, we are thanking God for the guidance He gave to the Lutheran reformers who based their confession of faith on the Word of the Lord. That oath is taken here in Ghana, too, by our partners in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ghana (ELCG). And so, this at times rather heady book is taught by us here so that when these men come to their ordination they too may make this BOC their confessional guide, their helper by summarizing the clear Word of God on a variety of topics.

As we prepare to come stateside next month, we are blessed to be visiting parishes that take this same subscription of the BOC. It is a comfort and a joy to know that we have people standing beside us as we stand beside the people of the ELCG. In a world that seeks to pervert the Word of God to their own likes, that changes Law into Gospel and Gospel into Law, we do give thanks for you faithful people; and we implore you to pray long and hard for this work. The devil afflicts us in many ways. But with your simple praying of the Lord's Prayer for us, we curse the devil by saying, "Deliver us from the evil one." Praise the Lord!
