What Is Laborers For Christ?

Laborers For Christ (LFC) is a service provided by Lutheran Church Extension Fund to help Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) ministries save money on their building projects.

Laborers are retired carpenters, handy people, farmers, school teachers and other willing workers. They are committed to working at minimum wage for LCMS ministries who desire to undertake the construction and improvement of their own facilities.

Life as a Laborer

Laborers travel in their RVs to live on the property while working on a project.

It's not unusual for Laborers to become part of the congregation: worshipping on Sundays, joining in Bible studies or singing in the choir.
