Christ the Victor

Living in the Third World forces one always to learn. Being Americans, we miss all the conveniences to which we are accustomed – grocery stores, one-stop car care, even parking! There is a lot there in the USA that isn't here; so, we spend a lot of time adjusting our way of living, cooking, and serving. But, from time to time, we are even more humbled when we realize what is common to us all: sin, sickness, and death. Rich and poor alike, wise man and fool, all fall under their effect (Psalm 49). It is the great equalizer between us all.

Recently, there were two deaths among people whom we know. The first was the death of one of our member's fathers (i.e., uncle on one's father's side). He was a Christian of another denomination. We went to his "funeral," which was very different from our culture. It proclaimed Christ as Savior that everyone needs, no matter his race or his religion. It was a bold sermon about Christ in a culture that rejects Him as Savior. The second was the death of our night guard's senior brother. He was a Muslim. We were awakened with the news early one morning. All we could do was go to greet in the house, to mourn with them, to express our sorrow for their loss, and to give a gift that will be used to bury the man. In contrast to the Christian funeral, it seemed so empty, so hopeless, and without a sense of victory.

While death comes to all men, it isn't really a great equalizer in the sense that it doesn't bring all men to the same end. To the non-Christian, death is far worse as the person finds himself outside of the kingdom of heaven and in the same torment for all who deny Christ. But for the Christian, death brings us into the presence of our Savior God. It brings us before the God into whose name we have been baptized. And we are at perfect peace.

This salvation is found only in Christ. Because of that, our church body as well as many others send missionaries to every part of the globe. And not only that, but send each member there at home to go and tell. It is the Church's privilege and joyous-duty to bear witness to her Savior, the risen Lord – Jesus Christ, Victor.

Christ is the victor! Those words bring peace to the dying and to the mourning both. They assure us that we do not merely perish as the beasts of the field. They promise us that death will not have the final say, but, rather, that even death will be defeated when Christ returns to judge the world and to gather His own. As they sing here in one of their worship songs: Jehovah has the final say!

Speak Christ! Witness to His victory! Let all the world join us in His praise! Amen.

We are looking forward to finishing the Ten Commandments and getting on to The Apostles' Creed.

He is, therefore, going to have a fourth surgery this weekend to place some hardware back in as well as to clean up some fibrous growths in his bones. He is supposed to go training with Dale later this year, but it is all questionable right now whether nor not he will be able to accompany Dale.

Also, we are readying the classes to be taught in the villages from August to October. Dale will be teaching New Testament Survey and Biblical Interpretation.
