Who Can Receive Holy Communion?

This is not an Anglican Table, but the Lord’s Table, and all who have been baptized in the name of the Holy Trinity and follow Jesus Christ are welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you are not prepared to receive communion, you are still welcome at the altar. Simply place your arms across your chest and a prayer of blessing will be prayed for you by a priest.

THE DISMISSAL

The Deacon, or the Priest, may dismiss the people with these or other words

Deacon Go in peace to love and serve the Lord. [Alleluia, alleluia.]

People **Thanks be to God. [Alleluia, alleluia.]**

Blessing

Receive and walk in the blessing of your Father who tenderly loves you and whose mercies are new every morning.

The Dismissal

The end of the service is the beginning. So the dismissal does not end with an “Amen.” Worship has no end – we continue to worship where we are called to go, in the name of the Christ we love.

position of the Church that receiving one of the Communion elements is sufficient to complete communion.

Won't I catch a disease when drinking from the cup? No. We use fortified wine, which acts as a disinfectant, and the rim of the cup is wiped between uses and slightly turned. Since the chalice is made of precious metal, it acts as a disinfectant as well.

If for some reason you are not prepared to take Holy Communion, we still welcome you to come forward to the altar rail. Just cross your arms over your chest and we will pray a blessing over you.

After Communion Prayer

Now it is time to go into the world to be on mission with God to love and serve the world, "...to show and share the gospel of the Kingdom of God." Worship is not selfish. We do not simply receive, we are sent to give.

THE MINISTRATION OF COMMUNION

Facing the People, the Celebrant may say the following invitation

The gifts of God for the people of God. [Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.]

The Ministers receive the Sacrament in both kinds, and then immediately deliver it to the People. The Bread and Cup are given to the communicants with these or similar words

The body of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was given for you, preserve your body and soul to everlasting life. [Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your heart by faith, with thanksgiving.]

The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was shed for you, preserve your body and soul to everlasting life. [Drink this in remembrance that Christ's blood was shed for you, and be thankful.]

The Celebrant may offer a sentence of Scripture at the conclusion of the Communion.

THE POST COMMUNION PRAYER

After Communion, the Celebrant says

Let us pray.

Almighty and everliving God,
we thank you for feeding us, in these holy mysteries,

The People standing, the Celebrant says this greeting

People **To receive glory and honor and power.**

THE COLLECT FOR PURITY

The Celebrant prays (and the People may be invited to join)

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

THE SUMMARY OF THE LAW

Then follows the Summary of the Law, or The Decalogue.

Hear what our Lord Jesus Christ says:
You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets.

THE FRACTION
*The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.
The following may then be said by the Celebrant*

People **Therefore let us keep the feast. [Alleluia.]**
*In Lent, Alleluia is omitted, and may be omitted at other times except during
Easter season. Following the Celebrant's lead is encouraged.*

THE PRAYER OF HUMBLE ACCESS
Celebrant and People together pray
We do not presume to come to this your table, O merciful Lord,
trusting in our own righteousness,
but in your abundant and great mercies.
We are not worthy so much as to gather up
the crumbs under your table;
but you are the same Lord,
whose character is always to have mercy.
Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord,
so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ, and to
drink his blood,
that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body,
and our souls washed through his most precious blood,
and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us.
Amen.

THE AGNUS DEI
The following or some other suitable anthem may be said
Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world,
have mercy on us.

Taking Communion
*May God feed and
nourish us with
himself. May we taste
and see that the Lord is
good!*
*If you wish to receive
the bread, hold out
your hands, palms up
and crossed. You may
eat it immediately or
keep it in your palms
and the Chalice Bearer
will take it from your
palm, dip it in the wine,
and place it on your
tongue. If you are to
receive the wine from
the chalice, please
assist the chalice to
your lips for a sip of
wine.*
*The person serving
the bread will say
something like, "This
is the body of Christ,
bread from heaven."

response is, "Amen,"

Prayer of Consecration
includes the **Institution**
and the **Consecration**.

Institution
This narrative recalls
the mighty act that is
the focus of the Lord’s
Supper: the gift of
Christ’s body and blood
to be our spiritual food
and drink. It is
customary to make the
sign of the cross †
when the bread and
the wine are lifted up.

Consecration
We ask the Holy Spirit
to sanctify, bless, and
make holy the bread
and wine that it
becomes the body and
blood of Christ, and to
bless and make us holy
as we receive this holy
sacrament. It can also
refer to the Great
Thanksgiving as a
whole.

The Lord’s Prayer
This is the prayer that
Jesus taught us to
pray.

THE PRAYER OF CONSECRATION

The People stand or kneel as able.
The Celebrant retells God’s Salvation History.

At the words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it, and here may break the bread; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing the wine to be consecrated.*

The Celebrant continues.

MEMORIAL ACCLAMATION

Then the Celebrant and People say

Great is the mystery of faith:
Christ has died,
Christ is risen,
Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues, then concludes with

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE LORD’S PRAYER

The Celebrant then says

And now as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to pray:

Celebrant and People together pray

Reader A Reading from the Revelation of St. John
the Divine.

Epistle, and Gospel. As
we listen to the word
read, hear the Holy
Spirit inviting us to live
in God’s unfolding
story. We rest in him
and listen for his
invitation to align
ourselves and follow
him.*

Silence
*Silence is active –
listening for the voice
of the Holy Spirit and
resting in God’s
presence.*

Kneel, Sit, Stand
Our body matches
what we are saying.
We stand at times to
honor God with
boldness for public
professions and prayer.
We kneel other times,
during confession, and
in reverence, as it is a
posture of humility.
We also understand
that some people are
not able to kneel or
stand. Standing or
kneeling is by
invitation, not
obligation.

THE OFFERTORY

The Celebrant may begin the Offertory with this or another sentence of Scripture.
Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.
Ephesians 5:2
During the Offertory the Deacon or Priest prepares the Holy Table for the celebration, and the offerings of the people are collected.
The People stand while the offerings are presented.
Then the following may be said.
Celebrant Yours, O Lord, is the greatness, and the power, and the glory, and the victory, and the majesty: for everything in heaven and on earth is yours; yours

to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers, ¹⁷ that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him, ¹⁸ having the eyes of your hearts enlightened, that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, ¹⁹ and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power toward us who believe, according to the working of his great might ²⁰ that he worked in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹ far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come. ²² And he put all things under his feet and gave him as head over all things to the church, ²³ which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all. THE GOSPEL **Matthew 5:1-12**

All standing, the Deacon or Priest reads the Gospel, first saying
Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint Matthew.
People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**
¹Seeing the crowds, [Jesus] went up on the mountain, and when he sat down, his disciples came to him. ²And he opened his mouth and taught them, saying:
³ “Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
⁴ “Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.
⁵ “Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.
⁶ “Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.
⁷ “Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy.
⁸ “Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

***The Gospel**
We all stand during the
gospel procession. We
turn our bodies, facing
the gospel book. The
clergy reads the gospel
from the center of the
community as a visual
reminder that Christ,
the Living Word,
became human and
dwelt among us. He is
still in the midst of his
community through
the Holy Spirit. Those
who wish to do so
make a sign of the
cross with the right
thumb on the
forehead, lips, and
heart when the gospel
is announced, praying
silently, “God be on my
mind, on my lips, and
on my heart.*

The Sermon
The sermon is to explain the meaning of the texts and calls followers to be obedient to God. How might we respond to him?

The Renewal of Baptismal Vows
This is the Apostles Creed in a question and answer format. It clearly states "the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints" and we joyfully declare what we believe. These creeds were put together in the first few hundred years of Christianity to confront heretical teachings. We have found them to be a concise summary of the Christian faith.

- 9 “Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God.
10 “Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness’ sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
11 “Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹²Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you.”

THE RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

On some occasions, the Renewal of Vows follows the Sermon. The Nicene Creed is not said.
The people stand.

The Celebrant addresses the Congregation in these or similar words

Through the Paschal mystery, dear friends, we are buried with Christ by Baptism into his death, and raised with him to newness of life. I call upon you, therefore, to renew the solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced the Devil and all his works, and promised to serve God faithfully in his one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

Celebrant Do you, here in the presence of God and the Church, renew the solemn promises and vows made at your Baptism and commit yourself to keep them?
People I do.
Celebrant Do you renounce the Devil and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?
People I renounce them.

Silence
The Deacon and People kneel as able and pray
Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, maker and judge of us all:
We acknowledge and repent of our many sins and offenses, which we have committed by thought, word, and deed against your divine majesty, provoking most justly your righteous anger against us.
We are deeply sorry for these transgressions; the burden of them is more than we can bear.
Have mercy upon us,
Have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for your Son our Lord Jesus Christ’s sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may evermore serve and please you in newness of life, to the honor and glory of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
Amen.

The Bishop or Priest stands and says
Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who in his great mercy has promised forgiveness of sins to all those who sincerely repent and with true faith turn to him, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE COMFORTABLE WORDS

The Celebrant may then say one or more of the following sentences, first saying
Hear the Word of God to all who truly turn to him.
Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.

Absolution
The absolution declares the wonderful promise of forgiveness that comes through the finished work of Jesus on the cross and resurrection. We hear the words of Jesus, "Your sins are forgiven."

Confession of Sin
The confession, compelled by worship and the hearing of the Word read and preached, reminds us that we share the common lot of humanity: "For all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). We

THE CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION OF SIN

The Deacon or other person appointed says the following

All who truly and earnestly repent of your sins, and seek to live in love and charity with your neighbors, and intend to lead the new life, following the commandments of God, and walking in his holy ways: draw near with faith and make your humble confession to Almighty God.

Celebrant Do you renounce the empty promises and deadly deceits of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God?

People **I renounce them.**

Celebrant Do you renounce the sinful desires of the flesh that draw you from the love of God?

People **I renounce them.**

Celebrant Do you turn to Jesus Christ and confess him as your Lord and Savior?

People **I do.**

Celebrant Do you joyfully receive the Christian Faith, as revealed in the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments?

People **I do.**

Celebrant Will you obediently keep God’s holy will and commandments, and walk in them all the days of your life?

People **I will, the Lord being my helper.**

The Celebrant concludes the Renewal of Vows as follows

Almighty God, you have built your Church upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the head cornerstone: Grant us so to be joined together in unity of spirit by their doctrine, that we may be made a holy temple acceptable to you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end. **Amen.**

The Celebrant may sprinkle the People with Holy Water and say, "Remember your baptism." Except in the Easter Vigil, the liturgy continues with the Prayers of the People.
