

The Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Ephesians (4:7-13)

Brethren, grace was given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore, it is said, "When He ascended on high He led a host of captives, and He gave gifts to men." (In saying, "He ascended," what does it mean but that He had also descended into the lower parts of the earth? He who descended is He who also ascended far above all the heavens, that He might fill all things.) And His gifts were that some should be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ.

The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew. (4:12-17)

At that time, when Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew into Galilee; and leaving Nazareth he went and dwelt in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulon and Naphtali, so that what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "The land of Zebulon and the land of Naphtali, toward the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles—the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of Heaven is at hand."

The Sunday After Epiphany

This Sunday is like an echo of the Feast of Epiphany. When the Gospel speaks of the prophecy of Isaiah being fulfilled (*"the people who wait in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned."*), it is a reminder that Epiphany is the 'feast of lights'. The light manifested on the banks of the Jordan now spreads into Galilee. Little by little, it will spread to the whole world. Jesus begins to preach and the theme of His preaching is exactly the same as John's. For John, however, the Kingdom of Heaven was 'coming', whereas for Jesus, the Kingdom is already 'at hand': The Kingdom is now identified with Him who announces it. Jesus is the essence and the power of the Kingdom. Nevertheless, this Kingdom is only at its beginning. We shall see it grow, and it will not cease growing until the end of time. This is exactly what St. Paul is declaring in this morning's Epistle when he announces that we shall *"attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ."* ***The liturgical year, an abridgement of the history of salvation, represents this growth symbolically for us, from Christmas until the time after Pentecost. It thus outlines the development of our own inner life - the life of Christ in us.***

A FATHER AND SON SERVE THE LORD

ST. SAVA OF SERBIA was a man whom we may best describe as someone who was more interested in SERVING a King (Christ) then BECOMING one himself! The youngest of three brothers, Sava, whose given name was Rastko, was the son of the famous Serbian King Stefan Nemanja. While succeeding his father one day was certainly not beyond the realm of possibility, Sava had little interest in his royal heritage. Instead, he was more interested in a contemplative life, content to spend his time in prayer and meditation.

The life of St. Sava took a dramatic turn when his father was visited by a group of monks from Mt. Athos, who were seeking financial aid for the monasteries there. Sava, now 17 years old, ran off from the court of his father, accompanying the monks back to the Holy Mountain. When Stefan realized that his son was missing, he launched an exhaustive search for him. After two years, his emissaries discovered the shocking truth: Sava was now living the ascetic life of an impoverished monk on Mt. Athos! Sava refused to return home, sending a letter instead, which extolled the virtues of monasticism and elaborated on the true meaning of Christian service. His father was so moved by Sava's writings that he relinquished his throne to another son - also named Stefan - and became a monk himself! Joining his son on Mt. Athos, the king took the new name SIMEON. Before dying in his humble surroundings, Simeon, with his beloved son, founded the famous Serbian monastery of Hilandar.

In later life, Sava was called to greater service of the Church. He was appointed the first Archbishop of Serbia, and was instrumental in bringing peace to his strife-torn homeland in the 13th century. St. Sava fell asleep in the Lord in 1236 A.D., and is still the most revered Saint of the Serbian people.
