To Savor and Cherish

One of the things I have learned about my eating habits over the years is that food is not just something to be consumed for the sake of appeasing the aches of hunger. The consumption of food is something to savor. To savor means to “delight in” and not just taste our food. It means to joyfully taste and revel in the moment where food is truly satisfying to us. I particularly find this to be true when I eat a rich dessert, a warm soup or a cup of hot tea on a frigidly cold day, or when just the right amount of herbs and spices dance together in a dish so delightful I will express “mmmm” regularly throughout the meal. A similar word comes to mind when thinking of the word “savor” and that is “cherish.” Each time I perform a wedding this word makes itself known in the liturgy: “To love and to cherish till death us do part.” I am so thankful the word cherish is in there because this suggests that it is not enough to simply say we will love someone, but the liturgy demands that words take us beyond themselves and into intentional action. When we vow to love and cherish someone we promise to intentionally make time to hold strong and dear the affection we have for the other. It is not a feeling entirely, but rather the intentional act of holding sacred the bond between two people. These two words are incredibly important acts of humanity because it is all too easy to eat our food without any awareness of its blessedness to our bodies and lives, it is all too easy to say we will love others, but to make that love be lived in action in the present moment is a powerful act of connection. We have lost sight of the power of savoring and cherishing.

My mother always used to say to me that we were never promised tomorrow so we ought to live fully today. Her wisdom reminds me of one of the more important lines in my favorite musical, *Hamilton*, “Look around, look around at how lucky we are to be alive right now.” These are wise words because all we have in life is what is right in front of us. Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow is unknown and not

promised. What we know and see and experience in this moment is where we find God and where we find hope and joy in one another. This past month I shared some news that I will be moving into a new position as Conference Minister for the Indiana Kentucky Conference as of May 1. I am deeply going to miss St. Paul's. In the wake of this news, I have shared in meaningful conversations with many of you about how this has made you feel, what is next for me and for St. Paul's, and how blessed we have been by God to share in our time together. These have not been easy conversations....likely not easy for either of us. However, they have revealed to me the strength of our sacred bond in faith and that is something that cannot be taken away no matter who comes and goes from our lives, either by death or by relocation. I am grateful for these connections we have formed, for the hope we have seen, and for the way in which God has formed us over these past 5 ½ years.

This is why I am going to listen to my mother's advice and spend my time in the final 2 ½ months together as pastor and congregation living out those two words that I began this article with: savor and cherish. I am going to savor each conversation I have with you and listen deeply for where it is that God is working in your life. I will cherish each drop of water on a baby's head, savor each ring put on the finger of another, hold dear each moment I walk through the door of your home to visit, and bless each youth who will be confirmed this spring. There is still so much left to be done in this short amount of time we have left together and I intend on showing up, savoring each moment, cherishing each relationship, and giving myself as fully as I can to the work of ministry still left.

What I am learning, however, is that savoring and cherishing is not just the work of saying farewell to a congregation or a pastor. These are acts of everyday living. Do I savor the presence of my children in our home? Surely I know deep down that I will blink and they will both be in college. Do I cherish my wife as I vowed to do so on our

wedding day? Am I eating my food with delight and awareness? Am I taking my most important relationships in life for granted? This leaves us directly in the middle of the present. Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow is never promised and as the scriptures tell us “it will have worries of its own.” But today? Today we can make the choice to savor and cherish every moment that God has given us. I am making the choice to savor and cherish each moment that I have. What choice will you make?

If we mope, weep, wring our hands and proclaim to all: "What are we going to do???"....then the congregation may also do the same. Let me be very clear about something....I want to mope, weep and wring my hands as I'm sure many of you do as well. It's OK to feel that way. We all need to process Chad's leaving in our own personal, private way.

However, for the sake of our church, we need to put our personal feelings aside. We need to reassure any and all members of our congregation that Chad is moving up and onward, serving God as he has been called to do.

Our church is stronger because of the leadership of Pastor Chad. We will be forever grateful to him for his time with us here and the awesome work he has done in helping us rebuild our church. Chad has us on the right path. We need to stay on that path. On our journey forward, we may feel-at times-that we are all alone on that path with no one to guide us. But God will be with us each and every step of the way. We can never repay our debt of gratitude to Chad. However, we can certainly honor his work here, all the lessons he has taught us and his time with us by continuing to move forward with the work that has already started- to grow our church, continue our missions to the wider community, provide for the growing needs of our children and to serve our God.

Our next challenge is ahead of us; we have a GIANT task to complete. But, we can and we will get through this, move forward and, with God's help, be stronger for it all.

We couldn't stop Chad from leaving; that was out of our control. However, we can and we will control how we react to it..

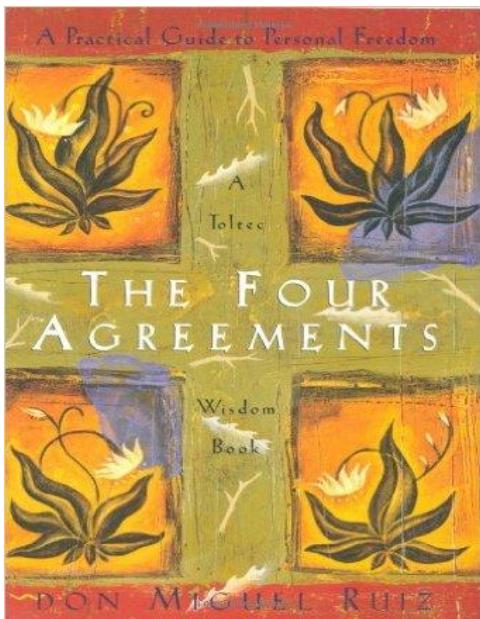

Sample Submission: Scripture for today, December 13, 2016: Psalm 42
“ . . .Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God.”

Reflection: This Psalm always reminds me of my grandmother. No matter what happened she always praised God.

Whenever we were at her house we would go for “Sunday drives.” On these drives the radio was never turned on; we would sing hymns from church and quote scripture. To this day those hymns and scriptures are part of who I have become. When I feel overwhelmed or lost, I can hear those songs . . .

“Amazing Grace”, “What a Friend We Have in Jesus”, “How Great Thou Art”, and many, many more. I can hear the words to the 23rd Psalm, Joshua 24:15, Matthew 11:30, and many, many more. By focusing on God. . . His words and songs of praise to Him, whatever difficulty I am experiencing seems not so big. I think that is what the Psalmist is trying to say.

Prayer: God of the universe, help me to not only feel your presence today but also to share your love with those I encounter.

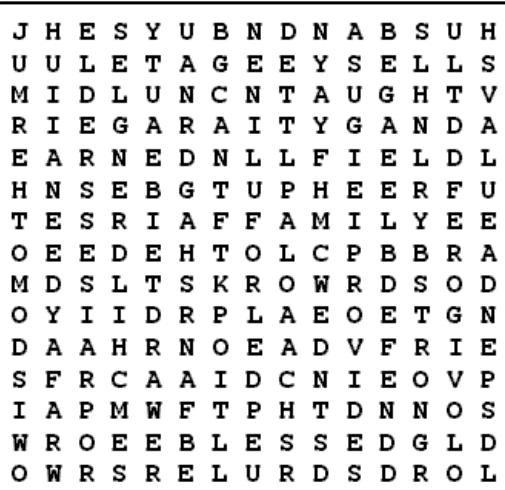

Fit the words in the list below into the diagram below reading forward, backward, up, down, diagonally, always in a straight line.

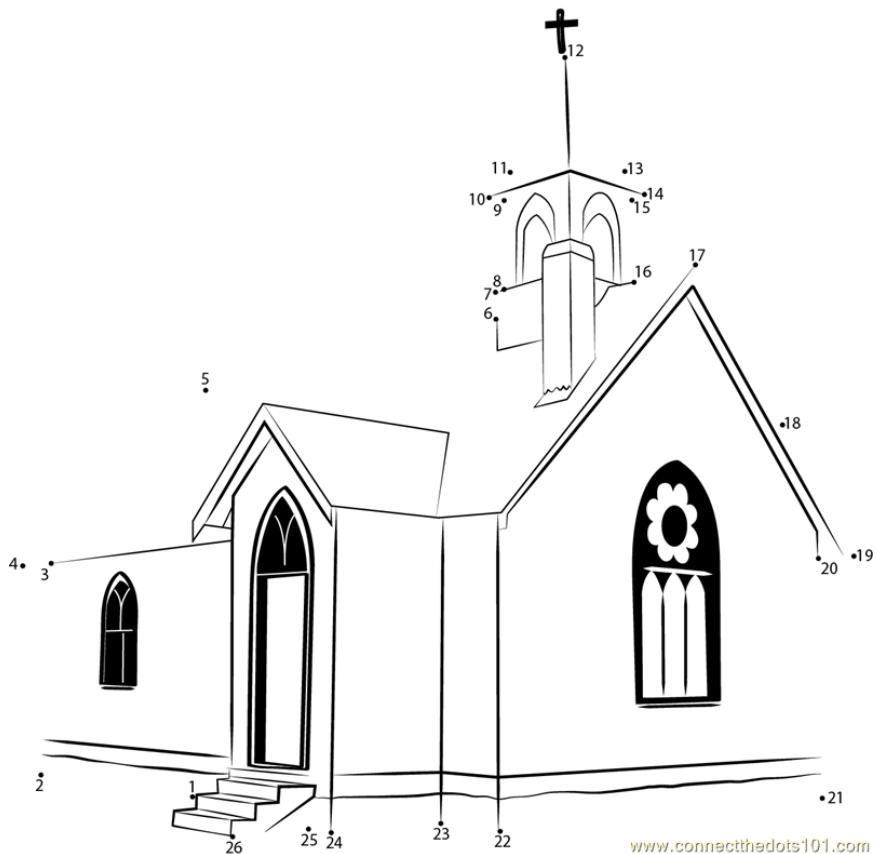

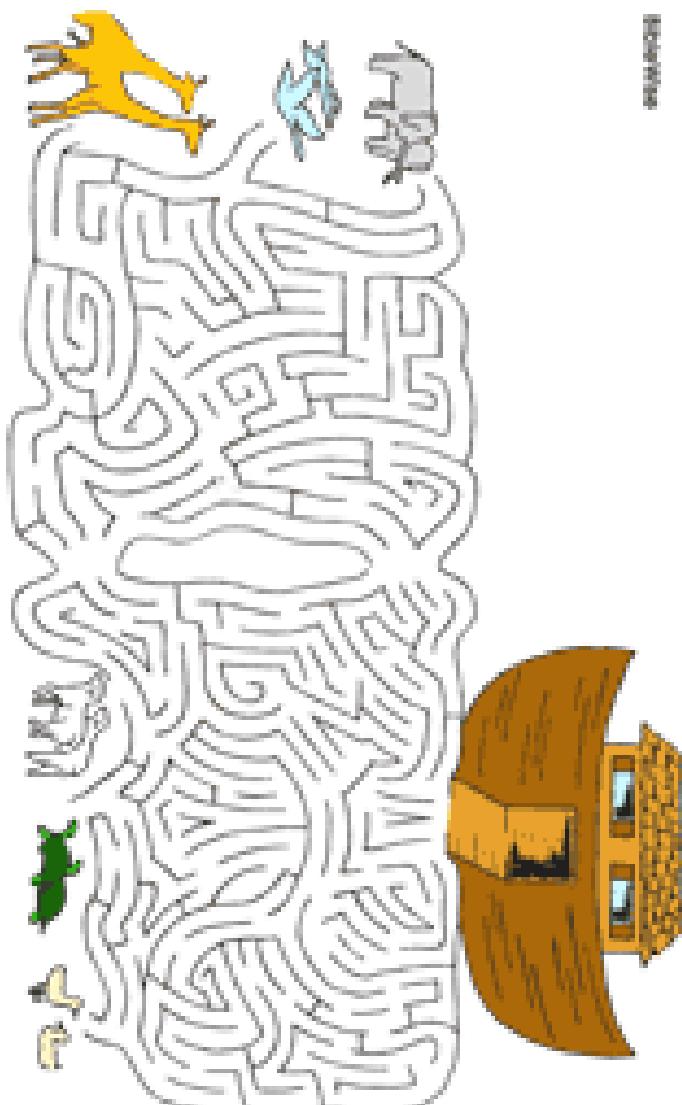
