2017 Year in Review

With the New Year beginning, it is always nice to sit back and reflect on the year that has just ended. The past year was a great one for GHA thanks to our many friends. Let's look back at the exciting events and activities that took place at The Grove during 2017!

- Grove Arrival Day was celebrated March 12 at the Glenview Public Library. The day was designed to introduce the local Korean community to The Grove. The presentation, given in Korean and English, focused on the significance of The Grove, both historically and as a nature preserve.
- Lorin Ottlinger stepped into the role of The Grove Director, following the retirement of Steve Swanson after 38 years of accomplishments and acquisitions. The Kennicott Archives Building was dedicated to Steve Swanson in honor of his service from 1979-2017. During this period, Steve's vision, guidance and determination made The Grove a national historic treasure. A plaque acknowledging his work has been placed on the Archives Building.
- The Smithsonian opened the *Objects of Wonder* exhibit at the the National Museum of Natural History. The exhibit, which showcases rarely displayed artifacts and resources from the museum's collections, features the skeleton of Robert Kennicott. Robert, a naturalist, collected many specimens for The Smithsonian Institution from 1852-1866.
- The pair of brass chandeliers, which once hung in the Beck Room of the Kennicott House, were, for the first time in approximately 50 years, re-hung there in June. While The Grove already possessed one of the original fixtures, the second was only recently donated back to The Grove.
- Nearly 100 GHA members and friends found a delicious way to support the Grove Heritage Association by attending a Farm to Table dinner, at the Redfield Pavilion in September.
- The Illinois Nature Preserves Commission unanimously voted to approve new nature preserve land at both The Grove and the Kent Fuller Air Station Prairie at their September meeting. At The Grove, a 21.5 buffer and 23.2-acre nature preserve were added to the existing 50-acres known as "Kennicott's Grove Nature Preserve." At the Kent Fuller Air Station Prairie, 30.24 acres of the 32-acre site have been dedicated as the "Glenview Naval Air Station Prairie Nature Preserve."
- This year, we welcomed 19 new Grove Heritage Association members. Won't you consider becoming a GHA member and help us in our mission of *Restoring the past...Preserving the future*.
- 2017 was also another successful year for ongoing programs, including: Christmas in the Woods, which offered clients of the Northfield Food Pantry (children and adults) the experience of Christmas at The Grove, our annual Plant Sale, Grove Folk Fest, the Arts and Craft Faire and the Holiday Store.
- The face of The Grove Heritage Association changed as we said goodbye to Board members Jeff Beckman, Elizabeth Kopp and Cheri McNish. And, we say happy retirement to The Grove's long-time Program Supervisor and Grove Heritage Association Staff Liaison, Kris Van Voorhis, who announced her retirement in December.

The Grove bids a fond farewell to Kris Van Voorhis

The Grove's long-time Program Supervisor and Grove Heritage Association Staff Liaison, Kris Van Voorhis, announced her retirement in December. Kris has been a mainstay at The Grove for over thirty years. She began her tenure as a volunteer with school programs and in the Kennicott House retail store in 1983. Kris was hired by the Glenview Park District in 1986 as a part-time program instructor and camp director. Her outstanding service led to a promotion to the part-time role of Grove Program Coordinator in 1995 and the full-time position of Program Supervisor in 1996.

Kris's duties over her long career have included managing countless programs, events and The Grove's museum store. She was instrumental in furthering the joint curriculum with Glenview School District 34 for historical and environmental education. School field trips have grown exponentially under her direction from just a handful of classes to over 800 groups annually! Kris developed many recreation program opportunities at The Grove such as birthday parties, sleepovers, hayrides, preschool enrichment, adult arts, and home school week. She established numerous special events over the years including Civil War Days, Earth Day, Upscale Resale, Pumpkin Trail, Dessert with Santa, Ladies Night, Redfield Designer Show House, and Pioneer Day.

Of course, her true passion has always been the Holiday Craft Faire. Kris is an avid crafter and sold her creations in a small bazaar out of a friend's home. In 1985, Kris and two partners approached the Glenview Park District and Grove Heritage Association with the idea of hosting a craft fair at The Grove. The event was very popular, with long lines of people wrapping around the houses. Some 33 years later, the Holiday Craft Faire has generated hundreds of thousands of dollars in revenue and grown into a holiday tradition for so many shoppers. The success of the show can largely be attributed to Kris's dedication, creativity and attention to detail. Kris has also worked closely with the Grove Heritage Association as Staff Liaison to their Board. She collaborated with GHA on dozens of other programs, events, and fundraisers resulting in substantial income for land acquisition and other projects at The Grove.

I have had the pleasure of working with Kris for the past 22 years and she's been a wonderful role model, coworker, and friend every step of the way. Kris was always there for me and many other staff members with kind words of encouragement and sage motherly advice. Her contributions, commitment, and integrity did not go unnoticed. On December 21, 2017, she was recognized by the Glenview Park Board of Commissioners with an official proclamation. Please join us in congratulating Kris on her retirement and wishing her nothing but the best in the next exciting chapter of her life!

From The Grove Archives

For those of you who have walked The Grove's "back fifty," have you ever wondered about the small cemetery that lies between The Grove's property and the property that once belonged to our neighbors, the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer? I have been asked about this cemetery more than once and I thought the answer might be of interest to our readers.

In 2010, the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, commonly known as the Redemptorists, decided to sell the Villa Redeemer property on Milwaukee Avenue, in Glenview. On April 22, 2015, this land was sold to David Weekley Homes, a builder, who then used the property to construct a community of 48 single family homes on the site. Eight acres of this land were donated to The Grove by the developer and 12.5 acres were obtained with a grant. This preserved land, on the north side of the property, created an improved buffer between the residential development and The Grove.

The Glenview Park District maintains the Villa Redeemer cemetery containing the remains of 102 Redemptorists. This is the cemetery you will come upon during your walk. We have a list of the Brothers buried in this cemetery and we often show relatives where their relations are buried.

If you visit The Grove and decide to take a walk in the back fifty to visit this cemetery, we ask that you enter it on The Grove's side because of the home construction on the other side. I think it is a peaceful place to spend a few minutes and learn some new history about The Grove's former neighbors.

Referendum Information Meeting March 11, 4:00 p.m. at The Grove Kennicott House
