# How much food can you buy for \$16?

A tool for service providers to educate about the FoodShare benefit



#### What is FoodShare?

FoodShare, also known as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), is a federal program that provides assistance with purchasing groceries. FoodShare benefits are put on a QUEST card (similar to a debit card) for each month that a person is eligible for benefits.



#### **ELIGIBILITY**

You may qualify if your household's gross monthly income is less than...

Income guidelines are valid through September 30, 2017

#### **Speaking of FoodShare...**

- For most members there is **no asset limit!** (An asset limit does apply to elderly, blind or disabled persons whose gross income is greater than the limits listed above).
- Many households can get more than \$16/month, but the \$16 minimum benefit for eligible one- or twoperson households is still worth it. That is equal to \$192 in one year!

- Your benefits carry over from month-to-month up to one year. Think of it like a rainy day fund if you have an unexpected medical bill or car repair, you can use your saved FoodShare dollars on groceries.
- You are helping your community by claiming FoodShare. The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that every \$5 spent in FoodShare generates nearly \$9 in local economic activity.

#### **FoodShare Application Process**

- 1. Complete and submit a FoodShare application. How to apply:
  - In person or over the phone with an outreach specialist at a convenient location;
     <u>Call toll-free at 1-877-366-3635 to set up an appointment!</u>
  - Over the phone with the local agency
  - Online at <a href="https://access.wi.gov">https://access.wi.gov</a>
- 2. Submit any requested proof to the local agency, such as proof of income, a copy of your identification card, and your medical expenses.



- 3. Complete either a telephone or an in-person interview with a caseworker from the local agency. The local agency will contact you for your interview or you can call them to complete the interview.
- 4. If you are approved for FoodShare and have never previously received QUEST card, you will receive a QUEST card in the mail. The QUEST card can be used to shop where you see the following logos. The card is used just like a debit card.











- You might receive a FoodShare Six Month Report Form in the mail asking if there are any changes to your household. This must be filled out and mailed to the local agency.
- FoodShare benefits are renewed once per year. You will get a form in the mail to fill out, and then you will have to complete another quick telephone interview.
