We will have plastic films placed on our windows to reduce heat loss during the winter. Kristin Cotts and David Keavney

I want to keep doing what I have been, but even more consistently. -Continue to use Robin's recipe for homemade laundry detergent. -Bring totes shopping whether I'm at the drug, grocery or hardware stores. -Use cloth napkins. -Keep using veggies from garden and go to the Farmer's Market for other fresh produce. -When the Farmer's Market's closed, continue to buy eggs and meat from the Staff of Life and Jake's when they make their winter drops at the DG train station. They are great people to know and shop from. Check out their websites. They both have "drops" this Saturday, but you have to place your order ahead of time. [staffoflifefarms.com](http://staffoflifefarms.com) for eggs, chicken, beef, bread, honey, cookies, jam and more [jakescountrymeats.com](http://jakescountrymeats.com) for mostly pork (great brats and bacon), but also fish, chicken, venison, maple syrup and more. -Put out a can of garbage only about once a month and recycle as much as possible. -Use the compost pile for all coffee grounds and tea bags, fruit and veggie scraps, egg shells and garden refuse. Grind up leaves and put into the vegetable garden. No fertilizer or pesticides. -Walk to church rain or shine, hot or cold unless it is really not possible. Peggy Gutzke

## Building and Grounds

In early December, we met with our snow removal contractor to review plowing plans to clear the new driveway and handicap parking stalls after a storm. LaMantia will ensure there is no trail of plowed snow in front of the east and west entrance curbs as well as the four locations where the curb cuts allow easier access to the sidewalks.

Thank you to all members for their donations to the Capital Campaign and their patience that allowed for the completion of the new driveway, sidewalks, curbs, railings and underground storm water detention system this past summer. Along with the Park District's Rain Garden along our SW border and our design to divert rain water away from the building, we are better equipped to deal with moderate level rain events and reduce the likelihood of flooding in fellowship hall.

In 2014, our annual Nicor expense was \$19,360. This year it is \$9,160. This results from both lower natural gas rates and a 17% reduction in therms usage. The new roof (2014) and wrapped rooftop ductwork (2015) are paying dividends.

The Capital Campaign has allowed our church to make many improvements and upgrades over the past 30 months. And address some badly needed deferred maintenance issues. The new church office, sound upgrades, HVAC controls, lighting upgrades and improved exterior door security are some of these improvements. In 2017, we need to replace aging roof top air conditioning units that are beyond their useful life, replace the sanctuary lighting that illuminates the chancel and complete the security project by installing exterior cameras and a monitoring system.

Your church leaders are wrestling with the issues of funding these future projects, repaying the loan from the Endowment account and establishing a Reserve Fund that will lessen the need for future Capital Campaigns. You will be hearing more before the Annual Meeting. Please continue your support and we will continue to care for our church and all who we serve.

## Greater Chicago Food Depository

The Greater Chicago Food Depository ( <https://www.chicagosfoodbank.org/> ) was started in 1979 and FC UCC has been volunteering for 23 years! Last year, the Food Depository distributed 70 million pounds of food, 35% of which was fresh produce.

GCFD regularly needs volunteers to help with repacking donated food and other products. A majority of the food received at the warehouse comes in bulk quantities and volunteers break it down into more manageable sizes. In a repack session you might be sorting produce, looking over a shipment of bread, or repacking bulk dry goods (cereal, pasta, rice) into smaller quantities. The repack sessions are a great introduction to the Greater Chicago Food Depository, the work they do, and the need that is seen in Cook County. Our church participates in social justice and food justice is another variety - 1 in 6 residents of Cook County use the food network each year

Because of volunteers, GCFD efficiently distributes quality food to 650 partner agencies and programs including food pantries, soup kitchens and shelters. They distribute 160,000 meals every day. Your time, talent and hard work as a volunteer make this daily response to hunger possible. In 2015, volunteer hours accounted for the equivalent of 48 full-time employees; that savings in salary and benefits meant more money could be used for purchasing fresh produce.

There is another benefit to volunteering at GCFD. When we volunteer there, GCFD credits \$5 for each hour we work to the food bank that FC UCC supports; that enables them to purchase more food at a great discount!

Twenty-three years ago First Congregational started the Wednesday Night Re-Pack sessions; each Wednesday we still support them! The sessions are held at the GCFD warehouse at 4100 W. Ann Lurie Place, Chicago, IL 60632 from 6-8:30pm. There is a car pool from the suburbs and some members that work in Chicago commute via the Orange Line. Please join us if you are 14 years old or older on Wednesdays!

To start the New Year, we are offering a Saturday session on 21 January from 1:30-3:30pm. Sessions on the third Saturday of each month include children! Any child who is at least 8 years old who is accompanied by an adult can volunteer. This is an excellent service opportunity for our youth of all ages!

Along with our regular Wednesday night attendance, look for announcements during the year of other Saturday opportunities to volunteer. 


