8:00 PM IN THE CHAPEL!



B&G Update

Sanctuary Lighting Project: Galvanic Electric has installed the required over-head electrical upgrades and JR Lighting is scheduled to install the new LED theatrical fixtures the week of October 30. The installation will be complete by November 3.

Included in the installation is a Sanctuary level lighting control to eliminate the need to go to level 5 to access these lights.

Personal Habits and Your Carbon Footprint

The stakes for our planet have never been higher. The world is warming, sea levels are rising, and the impacts of climate change are occurring faster and stronger than originally predicted. It is a global crisis with no place for partisan rhetoric, requiring solutions at every scale and across every sector.

These are the opening lines of the foreword of the book *Drawdown: the The Most Comprehensive Plan Ever Proposed to Reverse Global Warming* / edited by Paul Hawken, (Penguin Books, 2017). One of the more surprising solutions discussed in this book is the need to eliminate hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs) from refrigerators. Their capacity to warm the atmosphere is one thousand to nine thousand times greater than that of carbon dioxide. In fact, in Kigali, Rwanda in October 2016, 170 countries agreed that, starting in 2019, the world will begin phasing HFCs out of use. Scientists estimate the accord will reduce global warming by nearly one degree Fahrenheit. Therefore, each household should (1) avoid leaks from refrigerants and (2) destroy refrigerants at end of life.

Another surprising fact is that a third of the food raised or prepared does not make it from farm or factory to fork. The food we waste contributes 4.4 gigatons of carbon dioxide equivalent into the atmosphere each year - roughly 8 percent of total human-produced green house gas emissions. A fundamental equation is off-kilter: people who need food are not getting it, and food that is not getting consumed is heating up the planet. Studies have shown that 35 percent food in high-income economies is thrown out by consumers; in low-income economies, however, relatively little is wasted at the household level.

The type of food we eat is also important. If 50 percent of the world's population restricts their diet to a healthy 2,500 calories per day and reduces meat consumption overall, scientists estimate that at least 26.7 gigatons of emissions could be avoided from dietary change alone. This would make healthy, plant-rich diets one of the most impactful solutions at a total of 66 gigatons reduced.

Other solutions discussed in the text include: (10) the use of rooftop solar, (26) the use of electric vehicles, (31) improved insulation, (33) LED lighting in homes, (37) the use of mass transit, (43) less air travel, and others.

In addition, the Rev. Dr. Terry Gallagher has identified 48 steps to living sustainably - actions we all can take. These are available on the web: www.SustainingCreation.org. We suggest you follow his second suggestion to educate yourself on the actions you can take to reduce the devastation due to Global Warming by visiting his web site or consult the book *Drawdown: the most comprehensive plan ever proposed to reverse global warming*, which is now in the collection of the Church's library.
