

Capitol Update



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HB 7117 Statewide Medicaid Managed Care enhances the SMMC program by incorporating changes informed by experiences from the first five years of the program.

The House has a Medicaid bill on Special Order Calendar next week that advocates for persons with disabilities are watching. The bill has a work requirement and monthly premium payments that can be difficult for individuals with disabilities on Medicaid to meet. The penalty for missing one payment is one year without healthcare. There have been new state and federal proposals for Medicaid this year including block grants and per capita caps. **Please click [here](#) for the Councils position.**

Specifically, HB 7117:

- Consolidates the eleven SMMC program regions into eight regions, which reflect enrollee utilization patterns and provider referral patterns over the first five years of the program;
- Increases, in each region, the minimum or maximum number of plans with which AHCA will contract to provide services to MMA and LTC enrollees;
- Directs AHCA to request federal approval to require enrollees to engage in work activities to maintain eligibility for MMA benefits;
- Requires AHCA to fine managed care plans for failing to promptly pay provider claims;
- Requires LTC plans and providers to negotiate mutually acceptable payment rates, methods, and terms of payment; and

The bill has been placed on the House Special Order Calendar.

iBudget Waitlist and Provider Rate funding

The Council continues to be very concerned about the status of the iBudget waitlist. The Council is advocating for the House and the Governor's position to transition 682 individuals off the waitlist who have the most significant need.

In addition to seeking iBudget Waitlist funding, the Florida Developmental Disabilities Council is advocating for a \$7 million dollar increase to the reimbursement rates for Residential Habilitation, Personal Supports and Life Skills Development (LSD 1) Companion as priority services for funding increases for the 17-18 Fiscal Year.

[**HB 219 - Relating to Crisis Intervention by Law Enforcement Officers by Stafford Co-sponsors: Cortes \(J\)**](#)

Summary

This bill requires FDLE to establish employment training component relating to crisis intervention for individuals with Autism and mental disorders. The bill specifies instruction to be included in training component and provides that completion of training shall count toward continued employment instruction requirements. **HB 39 and SB 154** are moving with training for understanding those on the autism spectrum only. **The Council is supporting this bill.**

HB 95 - Relating to Consumer Protection from Nonmedical Changes to Prescription Drug Formularies by Massullo, Jr. Co-Sponsors: Baez, Byrd, Clemons (C), Cortes (J), Goodson, Grant (M), Gruters, Harrell, Jenne, Killebrew, La Rosa, Mercado, Miller (A), Plasencia, Renner, Brown CS Sponsors: Health Innovation Subcommittee

Summary

This bill provides that changes to prescription drug formularies during health insurance policy or HMO contract year do not apply to state group insurance program. The bill limits changes to health insurance policy prescription drug formulary during policy year and requires small employer carriers to provide continuity of care with respect to prescription drug coverage. This bill is being held up in the House over concerns about possible increases in the cost of a particular drug during the contract year. **The Council is supporting this bill.**

SB 104 - Relating to Computer Coding Instruction by Brandes

Summary

This bill Authorizes high schools to offer students opportunities to take specified computer coding courses. The bill provides that high schools will not be required to offer such courses and requires the Commissioner of Education to identify the computer coding courses that satisfy two credits of sequential foreign language instruction under certain circumstances. **HB 265** now has language that substitutes math for foreign language so sponsors are looking for a way to carve out students who are aphasic from the foreign language requirement. **The Council is supporting this bill**

Summary

Summary

This bill amends provisions relating to the use, prevention, and reduction of restraint and seclusion on students with disabilities. This bill takes out imminent danger language that discontinues the existing implicit use of imminent danger by virtue of its use as part of the reporting requirements.

The student's behavior leading up to and precipitating the decision to use manual or physical restraint or seclusion, including an indication as to why there was an imminent risk of serious injury or death to the student or others is an important reporting requirement that needs to stay included

Currently, there are individuals that think it is explicit when in truth it is implicit. We think that even though teachers can currently restrain and seclude children for any reason and for any length of

time in Florida at least implicit reporting requirements are better than nothing and we think have improved the treatment of children. The Council believes that restraint and seclusion should only be used in imminent danger to self or others. Please keep in mind that the largest use of restraint and seclusion is on children with disabilities age prek-3 grade so this is used on small children most frequently.

Another concern is the use of property damage as criteria for restraint and seclusion. There have been many cases of restraint and seclusion for minor property damage such as throwing down a pencil. Major property damage would certainly indicate imminent danger to self or others such as hurling equipment or punching walls.

Finally, the Council opposes any use of seclusion, prone restraint and mechanical restraint. There is no evidence that these types of restraint are effective or that they are missed when banned. There is too much evidence to the contrary for the Council to support these methods for any reason. For example, mechanical restraint is banned in many institutional settings.

Restraint and seclusion should never be part of a behavioral and individual education plan. Research shows that restraint and seclusion are not therapeutic techniques.

A combination of SB 810 and SB 1418 language was offered by Senator Stewart as an amendment to SB 926. This good amendment was later withdrawn and the sponsor indicated that the issue will be taken up next year.

Representative Edwards filed a Committee Substitute bill for CS/HB233 in the Education Committee and it passed. This bill included imminent danger as the only reason to use restraint and kept the imminent danger reporting language that is already in statute. The bill prohibits seclusion, straight jackets and restraints that block breathing. Mechanical and prone restraints are still included for imminent danger situations. **The Council prefers SB 1418 language and opposes SB 810 language.**

Summary

Summary

This bill;

- Consolidates the eleven SMMC program regions into eight regions, which reflect enrollee utilization patterns and provider referral patterns over the first five years of the program;
- Increases, in each region, the minimum or maximum number of plans with which AHCA will contract to provide services to MMA and LTC enrollees;

- Directs AHCA to request federal approval to require enrollees to engage in work activities to maintain eligibility for MMA benefits.
- Directs AHCA to request federal approval to require monthly enrollee premiums, based on income, as a requirement for eligibility and enrollment in the SMMC program. This includes a one year loss in health care if one misses a payment. **Amended Out - 04/25/17**
- Allows AHCA to waive the monthly premium due to hardship or for completing one or more healthy behavior programs; **Amended Out - 04/25/17**
- Requires AHCA to fine managed care plans for failing to promptly pay provider claims;
- Requires LTC plans and providers to negotiate mutually acceptable payment rates, methods, and terms of payment;
