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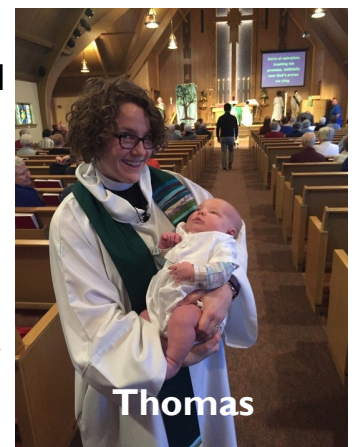


Tree of Life Banner Dedication January 15

Lately I’ve found myself to be quite hungry. It seems that Baby Boy Webb (due May 4, if you missed our announcement in November!) needs a little extra to keep on going! And yet, while I’ve felt hungry, I have at the same time been aware that I am not really hungry, not in the sense that others who do not have food or not enough food often are. My hunger pales in comparison to theirs, and I’m humbled to reconsider my hunger. What does it really mean to hunger? How can I out of my abundance aid those who really and truly hunger?

This comes from an awareness created by the Metro Chicago Synod and Bishop Miller as they’ve raised a challenge before us. During the Synod Assembly last June we voted unanimously to pass a resolution to support ELCA World Hunger. This resolved that “that the congregations of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod accept the challenge to raise one million dollars for ELCA World Hunger between **June 1, 2016, and October 31, 2017**; and that 100% of the offerings from the 2016 and 2017 Metropolitan Chicago Synod Assembly worship services be designated for ELCA World Hunger.” Since then, the synod has been raising awareness and challenging our congregations to meet this goal.

It seems to fit quite well with the work of St. Mark. Our mission statement is “Nourishing God’s People, Body, Mind and Spirit.” It is no secret that we like to feed people around here. We serve three meals to PADS guests each Monday into Tuesday. We gather food for the Mount Prospect Food Pantry and the Lutheran Church of the Cross Food Pantry. Our Backpack Ministry gives food to children who would otherwise be hungry over the weekend. We collect canned food in our shopping cart brigade at the 4th of July Parade. We gather for meals: Mardi Gras Potluck (coming soon!), Lenten Soup Suppers, Senior Lunch, Nibblers. In addition to that, we will give \$1000 to ELCA World Hunger from our benevolence in 2017.

And yet, I am confident that we can do more. This congregation is a generous one. In October we passed the Cubs hat to raise money to buy goats through ELCA World Hunger and raised \$300 in one Sunday, enough to buy six goats! Let’s continue that generosity. In the coming months you will hear of various opportunities. On **February 5** we will celebrate **Souper Bowl of Caring**. You are encouraged to bring canned goods, but also have the possibility of making a monetary donation. The food will go to the Lutheran Church of the Cross Food Pantry, the monetary donations to ELCA World Hunger. Then on **February 12** you can get a **Valentine Gram** for your loved ones by giving a donation to ELCA World Hunger Good Gifts for pigs, fruit trees or bees. More opportunities will come in the coming months. In the meantime, you are always welcome to check out the ELCA Good Gifts Catalogue on the Coffee Table or at www.elca.org/goodgifts for gifts for those hard to buy for friends and family. Together with our friends in Metro Chicago Synod and the church as a whole we can make a difference in ending hunger world wide!

Treasurer's Report

Fellow members,

I am pleased to share our financial results for 2016, pending a few minor adjustments. We ended 2016 with income of \$465,319, exceeding our budget by \$31,119. Our expenses of \$448,282 exceeded our budget by \$14,082. So we ended the year with a surplus above budget of \$17,036. This result was mainly driven by exceptionally generous giving through offerings, expenses above budget for property maintenance and operation, and expense control in compensation. In 2016 we withdrew \$8,500 per quarter from our bequest account to balance our budget. Since we achieved a \$17,000 surplus for 2016, I have directed Nancy Hundley to return \$17,000 back to the bequest account, conserving our funds for future budget year gaps or unknown emergencies. The Council affirmed this decision at its January meeting.

I would like to personally thank you for faithfully completing or increasing your offering pledges last year, and thanks in advance if you have increased your offering pledge for 2017. Our costs for maintaining and operating our buildings continue to increase, and of course, we want to continue to increase minister and staff salaries according to the increasing cost of living. We have been able to meet all of our budgetary needs with income, thus incurring no debt. Where appropriate, we have also used dedicated or memorial funds given to the church by our members to offset costs that otherwise would have come from income. All of this year's goals can be accomplished if we all pull together and commit ourselves to generously share our financial blessings to do the ministry of St. Mark Lutheran Church in our community.

Looking ahead to 2017 and 2018, we are preparing to replace major sections of roofing on our buildings, so additional capital funds will be needed to keep our buildings in safe and well-maintained condition. You will be hearing more about this from the Council in future meetings and publications. But for now, let's celebrate a year of positive financial results, and thank our Lord for His abundant blessings and for our vibrant, generous church family! “Living Stewardship”



You will recall that our fall emphasis on stewardship included a broadening of the traditional giving of money and volunteering to work in the ministry programs of the congregation to understanding that all of our daily living is included in the category of stewardship. Luther emphasized the concept of “vocation” as including everyone’s roles: children in school, retired people, men and women who are working as teachers, accountants, bricklayers, plumbers, construction workers, parenting, banking, homemaking—in other words, everything we do everyday is our vocation. Your daily life is your calling (assuming you’re not doing something illegal or dishonorable!) and God blesses and values that as part of your contribution to the good of your community and society.

There has been a tradition in the Christian Church that elevates some vocations above others. In the traditional church structures (e.g., Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican) certain people were set apart through consecration, ordination, or some special designation that implied, or sometimes stated that these roles were more important to God than the more common ones. In my childhood, I heard the phrase “full time Christian service” in referring to those who became pastors, missionaries, or church school teachers. Luther felt the church had gone too far in this direction, and taught from Scripture that all work is honorable and that lay people and clergy are equal before the cross of Christ. He went so far as to say that the gospel means all of us are priests to each other, and that together, through our service to each other, we form the body of Christ. So all of us are in full-time Christian service, whether we are butchers, bakers or candlestick makers.

Luther did not feel that specialized roles in the church were unimportant however. Clergy, teachers, and church musicians have important roles. But their roles do not give them special status or favor in God’s economy. Rather they have special responsibilities to use their gifts and training for the good of all. So pastors need to preach

faithfully, organists need to play as beautifully as possible, teachers need to impart knowledge—all to the glory of God, not themselves. The barber should cut and shave well, the baker should create the best bread possible because their vocations are just as important to God as the priest and bishop.

How does this help deepen our stewardship living? When we realize that in our daily interactions with people, whatever we do is our response to God’s love for us. If we show disrespect or an uncaring or superior attitude, our common life is diminished. But when I do something that is needful for society, when I do my tasks well so my community functions for the good of all, I’m giving back to God who created me to live and serve others. In doing my daily tasks with love and respect for the neighbor, I know that God blesses my work and it makes life meaningful and good.

One of the changes we’ll work on during 2017 is to remind ourselves weekly that our offering to God is not limited to the money and time we give to the church, but includes what we give through our daily work and living that makes the life of another better. That can be doing our regular duties well, even if that is unrecognized by others. But it also may include those holy moments when you were able to share the love of Jesus Christ with a person in need of a spiritual or physical lift—not necessarily in words, but through actions that made you and that person feel better. That’s stewardship of God’s gifts. Sometimes simply expressing gratitude to a person who did their job well can make you and that person have a better day.

As we embrace more forms of electronic giving, we need to have something to put in the “offering” plate that represents this broader understanding of stewardship. Your stewardship team is working on a simple “stewardship report” that identifies you as an electronic giver, but also solicits reports of the stewardship of daily living. More to come soon.

Living Wisdom Program Offered at St. Mark

Between January and April Contemplative Outreach of Chicago is offering four day-long workshops on a variety of topics related to prayer and spirituality at St. Mark. Several people have asked what the workshops are all about. The programs and people involved come from a diverse background of people from within and around the church who seek to live active lives of prayer rooted in the Christian contemplative tradition. Their work and workshops revolve around integrating a prayer practice like Centering Prayer, Christian meditation, lectio divina, the Welcoming Prayer, or hesychasm (an Orthodox spiritual tradition of praying the Jesus Prayer) into active, everyday life. These are prayer practices that are rooted in scripture and help nurture one’s relationship with God much like any devotional practice. These prayer practices are often practiced individually or in small groups, in monasteries or in retreat settings, and apart from daily work and life.

The Living Wisdom program is designed to offer participants a greater sense of community in their prayer lives and offer conversations and practices that integrate prayer with daily life. Members of Centering Prayer groups from St. Mark, St. Raymond’s, and St. Simon’s in Arlington Heights along with 40 others from all over the Chicago Metro Area are participating in the workshops.

If you are interested in learning more about the Living Wisdom Program, Contemplative Outreach of Chicago, Centering Prayer or any other prayer practices please let me know. Throughout Lent there will be several opportunities to explore different prayer practices like the ones listed above and soon a prayer space at St. Mark will be set aside for regular usage. Below, I will include links and resources if you are interested in learning more.

Contemplative Outreach

Contemplative Christian communities trace their roots to groups of third century Christian communities and members of Christian contemplative communities began coming to America in the 1800s, but it wasn’t until the 1970’s that Christian

Contemplative communities began teaching prayer practices to lay people. Contemplative Outreach is one of those first organizations. Cistercian monks in Spencer, Massachusetts formed Contemplative Outreach as a way to teach Centering Prayer to lay people. Today the non-profit organization has chapters around the world dedicated to teaching contemplative prayer practices.

Martin Luther

Dr. Luther, a monk, professor, and pastor, was steeped in the Christian contemplative tradition. He practiced and adapted contemplative prayer practices for lay people throughout his ministry. Often we only hear about his diatribes against the hierarchy of monastic life.
