TAKE HIGH QUALITY PHOTOS.

Your phone is not necessarily defaulted to take high resolution (hi res) photos, so you need to ensure that your camera settings are set to hi res before you begin snapping any photos for the yearbook. Without hi res photos, pictures will print blurry and will not be able to be used in the final product of the yearbook. NOTE: You should still be able to apply the same settings to your phone as the ones below, you may just need to follow a slightly different path.

IPHONE INSTRUCTIONS

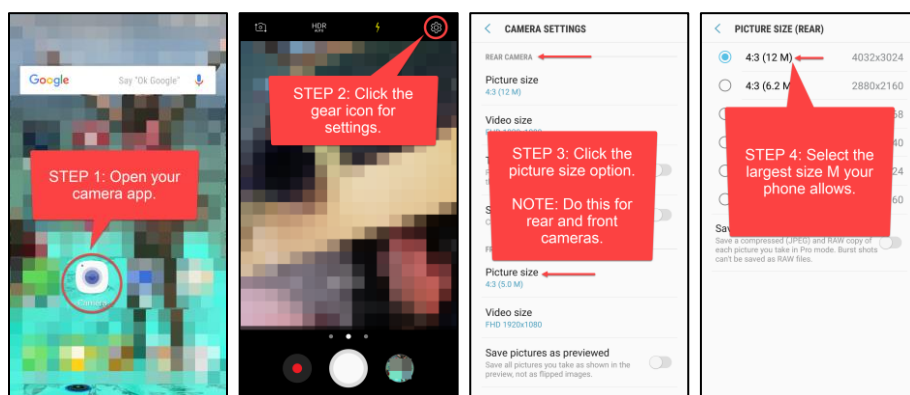

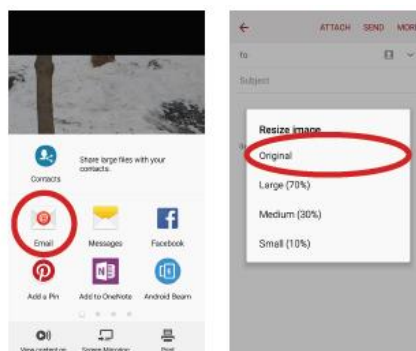
SAMSUNG INSTRUCTIONS

KEEP IMAGES HI RES WHEN SHARING PHOTOS.

To keep your photos at a high resolution, it is important to either upload them to your computer or email them at their original photo size. You cannot text the photos to another individual because texting automatically downsamples the photo into a lower resolution. If you are emailing the photo, be sure to select the ORIGINAL size, NOT large, medium or small.

CROP, DON'T ZOOM

Many smartphone cameras offer a digital zoom function, but you're almost always best served by pretending it doesn't exist. Even in the live-view preview, you'll be able to see how noticeably your images degrade the second you start to zoom.
