- New research shows that the rate of sea level rise has nearly tripled since 1990, in part because ice sheets in Greenland and Antarctica are melting. That's incredible. Scientists speak with increasing alarm about the urgent need to cut greenhouse gas emissions. On Saturday, April 29, more than 200,000 people marched in Washington, D.C. (with thousands more marching in cities around the country) to express their intention to fight for a just and thriving world. Climate change is not a Republican or Democrat issue – it is a human, moral, and deeply existential issue (as one placard in D.C. read: *No Sides on Climate*). The sermon I preached in D.C. on the day after the climate march was entitled, "[March for jobs, justice, and climate: Were not our hearts burning within us?](#)" A couple of weeks later I preached in Amherst on "[Secular or Spirit-led Activism?](#)"

Their presence alone makes this event worth attending.
