## **Stand Against Racism Data Snapshot**



**84% were women.**

(183 of 226 participants)



**60% identified as Non-Hispanic White or Euro-American.**

(131 of 226 participants)

**32% identified as Black, Afro-Caribbean, or African American.**

(52 of 226 participants)

**5% identified as Mixed race/ethnicity.**

(13 of 226 participants)



**94% witnessed racism experienced by others.**

(213 of 226 participants)

**58% have experienced racism personally.**

(128 of 226 participants)

**37% never participated in a Stand Against Racism event.**

(81 of 226 participants)

**58% preferred voting to advocate change.**

(126 of 226 participants)



**34% preferred person-to-person interactions to advocate for change.**

(75 of 226 participants)

**60% preferred anti-racism workshops.**

(131 of 226 participants)



**40% preferred intersectional ally trainings.**

(88 of 226 participants)

**96% voted in the November 2016 General Election.**

(210 of 226 participants)

**84% voted in the spring 2016 primaries.**
