84% were women.
(183 of 226 participants)



60% identified as Non-Hispanic White or Euro-American.
(131 of 226 participants)

32% identified as Black, Afro-Caribbean, or African American.
(52 of 226 participants)

5% identified as Mixed race/ethnicity.

94% witnessed racism experienced by others.
(213 of 226 participants)

58% have experienced racism personally.

37% never participated in a Stand Against Racism event.

58% preferred voting to advocate change.
