What IS Sisterhood? (A View From Atop a Pile of Rummage) **An Editorial Commentary**

In lieu of our usual President's column, this issue we are exploring what Sisterhood brings to our community, through the lens of our recently held pinnacle event, the Rummage Sale.

Study the mission of Sisterhood: To bring together the women of Temple Isaiah to serve our Temple, support our community, and enrich our lives through personal growth and friendship. We strive to foster and further the highest ideals of Judaism. We accomplish this mission through social and educational programs, worship, fundraising, community service, and involvement with the Women of Reform Judaism. Our activities, enhanced by the richness of our diversity, further our commitment to Jewish ideals, education, spirituality, social action, and leadership development.

Back to the Rummage Sale—the most often asked question post-rummage is “How did we do?” which means “How much money was raised?” Irene Rosenzweig might answer this question like this: We clothed a dozen refugees and their families for free. We sent hundreds of pounds of clothing to Haiti through a customer who returns year after year because he knows that we will contribute. We sent nearly a ton of clothing to Second Chances, a Somerville charity that provides free clothing to homeless and lower-income people. (We strive to foster and further the highest ideals of Judaism). We engaged over 150 volunteers, a combination of Sisterhood members, Temple members, LEFTY, Boy Scouts, and former customers who love our sale so much they now volunteer. (We accomplish our mission through community service). About 40 of those volunteers shared a sit-down meal together on Sunday evening, exhausted, exhilarated, and full of anticipation, prepared by the loving hands of other Sisters. We cried at the stories our customers shared with us about the difference this sale makes to their lives. We laughed and cheered as women modeled their finds. (Enrich our lives through personal growth and friendship). And, oh, yes, we did make a little money, to give away in the spring—over \$28,000. (Support our community.)

As you can see, the money is not really the thing. Sisterhood does do fundraising, yes. However, Sisterhood provides a

means for members (and others) to engage, to learn, to share our Jewish values, to enrich our own lives and lives of others.

Join Sisterhood this January 20-22 for a winter weekend full of fun, fellowship and spirituality!

Our Women's Weekend Away will be at the beautiful 4-star Hyatt Regency Boston - right in the heart of downtown Boston (on the edge of the Theater District, one block from the Boston Common, and steps away from shopping and the Downtown Crossing T-stop). Amenities include a beautiful indoor pool, sauna and fitness center.

Don't miss out. Study and worship with your sisters. Do a little swimming. Go for a long walk. Shop! Count yourself in!

We will board a bus at St. Brigid's Parking lot on Worthen Road at 1:30 pm Friday. We arrive at the hotel together, settle in and relax for a bit. Then the fun begins with some social activities and dinner in the hotel.

Should you choose not to take the bus, parking is available at the hotel for a fee of \$55 per night. (Take the bus!!) Another non-bus option would be to park at Alewife and take Red Line to Downtown Crossing and then walk through Macy's directly to the Hyatt lobby.

Cost for the weekend is \$360, double occupancy, or \$500, single occupancy. The fee, in both cases, is all-inclusive: all meals, workshops, bus, etc. (It has been eight years since our Weekend Away has had a price increase. This past spring the Sisterhood Board voted to increase the price to keep pace with rising hotel and food costs. It is sincerely hoped we will hold this price for a number of years, as we have done in the past. Even with the increased price, this event is significantly subsidized by Sisterhood.)

CANCELLATION POLICY: Full refund (minus a \$50 processing fee) is available through Tuesday, January 16. Cancellations AFTER January 16 will be refunded at 50%.

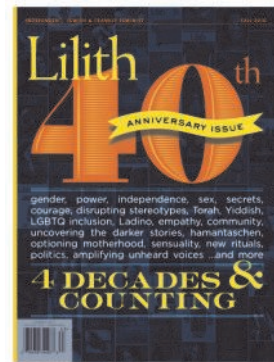

Sisterhood to Repeat Birthing Kits Project

On Sunday afternoon, December 4, the Sisterhood Social Action Committee will again sponsor an event to make Sterile Birthing Kits for the women of Haiti. Last March 40 women (and one young man!) participated in the making of 400 such kits, which were sent to Midwives for Haiti. This wonderful organization carried the kits to the island and used them to assist the women of Haiti to have sterile, safe births, reducing infant mortality.

It is so simple. Imagine...a Chux pad, several pieces of string, a clean razor blade, some alcohol wipes, a bar of soap, and 2 pairs of latex gloves can make the difference between life and death for these babies. Each kit costs just one dollar. What a privilege to participate in this mitzvah! This year we plan to make 600 kits. That means we need between \$900 and \$1000 to cover the materials and the postage to ship them to Midwives for Haiti. We hope you will consider a donation to offset the cost.

On Sunday, December 4 we will need up to 60 helpers of any gender. If you can offer us a few hours that afternoon for this wonderful mitzvah, please send your name, email and phone number to Barbara Mende at Barbara@moosehill.com. by December 2. The Social Action Committee will have assembly lines set up with all of the materials, and complete instructions for you. Volunteers must be at least 13 years old...this is a great Tikkun Olam (repairing the world) opportunity for teenagers and young

*Although we are hoping for clear and sunny skies, there have been times when Mother Nature has had other plans. If the seder is canceled due to inclement weather, you will be notified.



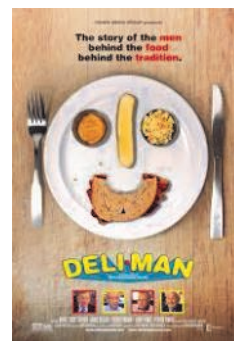
Movie Night—Deli Man
