## Learn a Foreign Language at Martin Luther

At Martin Luther High School, we offer two foreign languages: Spanish and Chinese. There are four levels of each language as well as a Spanish culture class. Spanish 1 covers basic conversation skills and simple vocabulary and tenses Spanish 2 teaches more common tenses and phrases. In Spanish 3 and 4, Mr. Kollmorgen focuses on expanding students' Spanish vocabulary and perfecting their speaking and reading skills. Spanish is a useful class to take because it's the second most spoken language in the United States. Chinese also has four levels, but Chinese class is a little different because as the students learn the language, and they also learn about the Chinese culture. In Spanish classes, culture is focused on in the Communications & Culture class, but Chinese does it early in Chinese 1. In Chinese 1, 2, 3 & 4, the skills are similar but every time the student moves up a level, the vocabulary gets more in depth. Culture is very important for this class because the teacher teaches the students about the important festivals and days in Chinese culture. For example, for the Mid-Autumn Festival, the students make and eat mooncakes to celebrate, while on the Chinese New Year, the students make dumplings. The Chinese classes also take a field trip in Mid-May to Chinatown in Chicago. It's a full day to get a taste of China and a great opportunity to speak Chinese and show off what the students have learned all year. Incoming freshmen should take Chinese class because it's challenging but not too hard and because there are lots of opportunities to practice Chinese at Martin Luther.
