Day 1

- **Transfer by private 25 seat bus from Seattle to Vancouver**
- **Stop at the Seattle Space Needle:** This icon of the American Northwest has adorned everything for movie screens to postage stamps. Built in 1961 for the 1962 World's Fair, the Space Needle features outdoor elevators and a rotating restaurant at its top
- **Stop by “Gastown”:** This city in British Columbia is the most populated metro area in western Canada. This historic city grew from an 1867 settlement called "Gastown." Visitors can take a boat ride to nearby Victoria on Vancouver Island. Named for seaman "Gassy" Jack Deighton, this historic district in Vancouver has a colorful history that culminates in its function today as a hub for technology and popular shopping and dining locale for tourists and locals alike
- **Stop by Chinatown:** The Chinatown in Vancouver, British Columbia, on Canada's west coast, is the largest Chinatown in Canada. It is also a National Historic Site, and its many historical locations, shops, and eateries make it a popular destination for tourists
- **Stop in Stanley Park:** One of Vancouver's main tourist attractions and beloved by visitors and locals alike, this massive park on the western coast of Canada is not to be missed. Stanley Park was the first park in Vancouver, and remains the largest
- **Check in to the Hotel Le Soleil (or similar 5 star property) for 3 Nights Double occupancy (Single occupancy can be arranged for an additional fee)**

DAY 2 & 3

Visit Victoria, BC – BC Parliament Buildings; Beacon Hill Park; Butchart Gardens; Chinatown Victoria; Mile Zero; Peak 2 Peak Gondola; Stanley Park; Vancouver Convention Center; Capilano Bridge



This city on Vancouver Island in the central Pacific Ocean is the capital of British Columbia. It is home to many popular attractions, such as Beacon Hill Park, Butchart Gardens, the British Columbia Parliament Buildings, and more.

BC Parliament Buildings - The British Columbia Parliament Buildings are where the Legislative Assembly of British Columbia meet. They are located in Victoria, British Columbia, at the southern tip of Vancouver Island. Visitors can marvel at the Baroque architecture and sprawling lawns

Beacon Hill Park, located in Victoria, British Columbia, contains hiking trails, a waterpark, two playgrounds, a petting zoo, and botanical gardens, among many other attractions. Loved by locals and tourists alike, the 200-acre park has something for everyone

Butchart Gardens - These world-famous floral gardens are located on a 55-acre estate on Vancouver Island's southeastern point in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada. People from around the world have been coming to see the gardens for more than 100 years.

Chinatown Victoria - The oldest Chinatown in Canada is located on the Pacific coast of British Columbia in the city of Victoria. This artistic and cultural center has features such as its famous Chinese Gate, which is guarded by lion statues.

Mile Zero - An area of southwestern Beacon Hill Park at Douglas Street in Victoria, British Columbia is the beginning of Canada's Number 1 Highway, which stretches the entire length of the country. A monument marks "mile zero" to visitors

Whistler – Peak 2 Peak Gondola - The highlight of this Canadian mountain town is the Whistler-Blackcomb Ski Resort, the largest ski resort in North America. Whistler Blackcomb sees more than two million visitors every year. In the summer, parts of it become a bike park

The Peak 2 Peak Gondola is a cable car that connects Whistler and Blackcomb Mountains at the Whistler-Blackcomb Ski Resort in British Columbia, Canada. It holds the world record for longest span between towers for a cable car.

Stanley Park - One of Vancouver's main tourist attractions and beloved by visitors and locals alike, this massive park on the western coast of Canada is not to be missed. Stanley Park was the first park in Vancouver, and remains the largest.

The Vancouver Convention Centre in British Columbia, Canada is one of the country's largest convention centers. It has twice been selected as the "World's Best Convention Center." The Center was an important place in the 2010 Winter Olympics.

Capilano Bridge - This breathtaking, 460-foot-long pedestrian suspension bridge takes guests through the treetops above the Capilano River in an eponymous park in North Vancouver. It has existed in some form since 1889, though it has been rebuilt several times.
