## Biographies



### **SUSANA MARTINEZ, GOVERNOR OF NEW MEXICO**

Susana Martinez was sworn in as Governor of New Mexico on January 1, 2011, and re-elected on November 4, 2014. She is New Mexico's first female governor and the first elected Hispanic female governor in U.S. history. Prior to serving as governor, Martinez was a prosecutor for 25 years. In 1996, she was elected District Attorney for the Third Judicial District in Doña Ana County, New Mexico. She was re-elected three times, holding the position for 14 years, where she prosecuted some of the toughest cases,

such as physical and sexual child abuse and child homicide. She was twice named New Mexico's "Prosecutor of the Year." Governor Martinez was named by TIME Magazine as one of the 100 Most Influential People in the world in 2013.



### **JAVIER GONZALES, MAYOR OF SANTA FE**

Before being elected mayor in 2014, Javier Gonzales served on the Santa Fe County Commission for two terms; was the first Hispanic president of the National Association of Counties; two-term State Democratic Chair; and regent at New Mexico State University, where he is an alumnus, the first in his family to graduate from college. An advocate for pro-immigrant cities, he has worked to expand Early Childhood Education and overseen major investments in Santa Fe's city's parks, streets and quality

of life, while launching innovative programs to address public health, climate change, poverty and inclusivity. Mayor Gonzales is proud to lead the top New Mexico city in Film and Startup Employment.



### **JENNY KIMBALL, CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD, LA FONDA HOTEL CORPORATION**

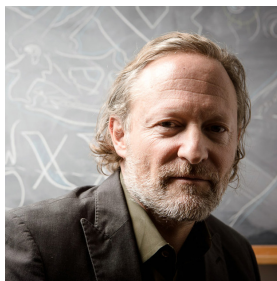
Jenny Kimball is the Chair of the Board of the historic La Fonda Hotel, an original Harvey Hotel, and is responsible for all strategic decisions of the company. She graduated from Southern Methodist University, where she also completed her law degree. She practiced real estate law in Texas and New Mexico before serving as President of ECOM Foundation, a national nonprofit involved in educational issues. In Santa Fe, she serves on a number of nonprofit

boards, including Vice Chair of the Santa Fe Community Foundation and Commissioner for the New Mexico Tourism Commission, as well as a member of the board of the Santa Fe Botanical Garden.



### **BARBARA FELIX, FOUNDER, BARBARA FELIX ARCHITECTURE AND DESIGN**

Barbara Felix founded Barbara Felix Architecture and Design in 1998 and has completed a number of award-winning projects throughout the New Mexico, including the historic La Fonda Hotel. She has a passion for the built environment, sustainable design and the mix of cultures that makes New Mexico unique. She serves as chapter President of the American Institute of Architects New Mexico. She also is a board member of the Laguna Housing Development and Management Enterprise for the Pueblo of Laguna and the Historic Santa Fe Foundation.



### **DR. DAVID KRAKAUER, PRESIDENT AND WILLIAM H. MILLER PROFESSOR OF COMPLEX SYSTEMS, SANTA FE INSTITUTE**

David Krakauer is the President and William H. Miller Professor of Complex Systems at the Santa Fe Institute. His research explores the evolution of intelligence on earth. This includes studying the evolution of genetic, neural, linguistic, social and cultural mechanisms supporting memory and information processing, and exploring their generalities through the use of empirically supported computational and

mathematical models. In addition to his many research awards, he was named one of the 50 people "who will change the world" by WIRED magazine.



### **DR. ESTEVAN RAEL-GALVEZ, PRINCIPAL CONSULTANT, CREATIVE STRATEGIES 360°**

Dr. Rael-Galvez, a native son of the Southwest, is a writer, creative strategist and founding principal of Creative Strategies 360°, which supports transformative work within communities, governments and culturally-based organizations. He has served as Senior Vice President of Historic Sites for the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Executive Director of the National Hispanic Cultural Center, and State Historian of New Mexico. Most

recently he led the development of Culture Connects Santa Fe, a cultural plan for the City of Santa Fe focused on the intrinsic value of culture and how it can be leveraged for the vibrancy, health and wellbeing of the community.



### **CARMELLA PADILLA, AUTHOR AND CULTURAL HISTORIAN**

Carmella Padilla is a native of Santa Fe, and a journalist, author and editor who explores intersections in art, culture and history in New Mexico and beyond. She has published in the New York Times and Dallas Morning News and has written several books, including The Work of Art: Folk Artists in the 21st Century and Low n' Slow: Lowriding in New Mexico. Padilla received the New Mexico Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts, the state's highest artistic honor, in 2009.



**DR. FRANCES LEVINE, PRESIDENT AND CEO, THE MISSOURI HISTORICAL SOCIETY AND MISSOURI HISTORY MUSEUM; FORMER DIRECTOR OF THE NEW MEXICO HISTORY MUSEUM; AUTHOR**

Dr. Frances Levine is President and CEO of the Missouri Historical Society and Missouri History Museum. She was Director of the New Mexico History Museum in Santa Fe from 2002 to 2014, where she was responsible for the development and creation of the new museum building and exhibits. She is an author, co-editor or contributor to a

number of books. Her most recent publication, *Dona Teresa Confronts the Spanish Inquisition: A Seventeenth Century New Mexican Drama*, won the Southwest Book Award. Other books include *Telling New Mexico: A New History and Frontier Battles and Massacres: Historical and Archeological Perspectives*. She is active in professional associations and has served as an evaluator for the American Alliance of Museums Accreditation review process.



**NORA NARANJO-MORSE, SCULPTOR, WRITER AND FILM PRODUCER**

Nora Naranjo-Morse is a member of a large family of celebrated artists from Santa Clara Pueblo. She is a sculptor, writer and film producer, who examines social change within Pueblo culture and comments on the lives of contemporary Native women. She is best known for her work in clay. Her installation, *Always Becoming*, is on view outside the Smithsonian Indian Museum's south entrance. She has received the Eiteljorg Fellowship and her work has

been in exhibitions at the Canadian Museum of Civilization, Heard Museum, and Wheelwright Museum, in addition to the Smithsonian and the White House.



**IVY ROSS, VICE PRESIDENT OF HARDWARE DESIGN AND RESEARCH, GOOGLE**

Ivy Ross is the Vice President of Design and UX for the Hardware Product Area of Google. Previously she was VP of Project Aura (Glass and Beyond). She has held various executive positions ranging from head of product design and development to Chief Marketing Officer to President with several companies, including Calvin Klein, Swatch, Coach, Mattel, Art.com, Bausch and Lomb and Gap. Ivy has been a contributing author to numerous books. Ivy has been cited by Fast

Company and Businessweek as "one of the new faces of Leadership." A renowned artist, her jewelry is in the permanent collections of twelve international museums. Ivy's passion is human potential and relationships. She believes in the combination of art and science to make magic happen and bring great ideas and brands to life.



**WILLIAM MILLER, PRESIDENT OF MILLER STRATEGIC CONSULTING, LLC, AND FOUNDER AND CHAIRMAN OF CREATIVE SANTA FE**

William Miller is President of Miller Strategic Consulting, LLC, an organization that invests in and actively participates in the management and development of entrepreneurial enterprises. He is the Founder and Chairman of Creative Santa Fe, a unique nonprofit that leverages Santa Fe's extraordinary intersection of arts, culture, history, science, technology and intellectual assets to solve global and local

Dr. Robert Martin became President of the Institute for American Indian Arts (IAIA) in 2007. There, he led the development of a comprehensive strategic plan and master campus facilities plan resulting in the expansion of the academic program, construction of four new buildings, growth in student enrollment and launch of a capital campaign. His prior leadership positions were at the University of Arizona, the Southwestern Indian Polytechnic

Institute, the Tohono O'odham Community College and Haskell Indian Nations University. He is an enrolled member of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma. He serves on a number of nonprofit boards nationally and locally. He has received awards from the Kansas Bar Association and an honorary doctorate from Baker University and received the Tribal College President of the Year Award.

## HEALTH BULLETIN

Altitude sickness can happen at high altitudes, like Santa Fe, which is at 7,000 feet where the air contains less oxygen and your body has to work harder to breath. Give yourself time to adjust—it can happen even if you're physically fit! People with heart disease, who smoke or have chronic lung problems such as asthma or emphysema may be more affected. Alcohol also affects people much more intensely at altitude.

## SYMPTOMS INCLUDE:

Drowsiness • Dizziness • Fainting • Prolonged headache  
Tiredness or weakness • Loss of appetite • Nausea • Trouble sleeping  
Shortness of breath with exertion

## How to prevent altitude sickness:

Take it easy! Visit the Oxygen Bar during cocktail hour on Friday night and drink plenty of water or sports drinks; hydration is key. Alcohol, tranquilizers and sleeping pills can have more potent effects at higher elevations so cut back or avoid them. Since anything containing caffeine can dehydrate you, drink plenty of water. Some people take medication that may prevent altitude illness and speed acclimation. One example is ChlorOxygen, an herbal medicine available at Herbs, Etc., 1345 Cerrillos Road in Santa Fe, 505-982-1265.
