

Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival

"I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Matthew 25:35-36

The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival (PPC) is launching a long-term, multi-year campaign to unite the poor and disenfranchised and to challenge the interconnected evils of systemic racism, poverty, the war economy and militarism, and ecological devastation. A period of 40 days of moral action begins on May 13, 2018.

How can we participate in the 40 Days of Moral Action?

Join the PPC in Albany on Mondays, starting Monday, May 14 for Nonviolent Moral Fusion Direct Actions. [Register for the May 14 action in Albany](#). The New York State Steering Committee indicates that if you register, you will receive email about buses from New York City to Albany. There will be options to risk arrest during the action; those interested in risking arrest should participate in a training on Monday mornings. Buses will be scheduled to arrive in time to allow individuals to participate in the training. On the week of May 27, the action day will be Tuesday, May 29.
