LOL: Jews & Our Hysterical History with Humor

And we will look towards an ultimate project of creating a sort of appendix to the traditional *Luah* that will document shared practices of our community that we hold dear, and consider new ones we may want to propose.

Leading our Future and Making our World a Better Place

This seminar aims to empower and enrich our TIC learners as they become leaders and change agents in the TIC community and beyond. In this seminar, we will explore leadership styles through real life experiences. We will look at what makes someone a “good” leader and discuss models of leadership in today’s world. We will consider biblical leaders, such as Moses and Deborah, and more contemporary leaders, including Ruby Bridges, Golda Meir, Martin Luther King, Jr., and Bill Gates. We will explore the way these leaders represent their commitments to their community and their world through meaningful social change initiatives. We will also work together in creating and leading experiences for our TIC teen community throughout the year.

In various settings such as youth groups, summer camps, and here at TIC, our teens are Jewish leaders and serve as role models. Meeting weekly, this cohort will build community through shared learning experiences, address the challenges teens face in various roles, and have the opportunity to put leadership skills to action. By exploring how our own beliefs and Jewish lives affect our leadership roles and social change efforts, we will think critically about our impact as Jewish leaders and agents for social change.
