

### Lenten Journey

Lent invites us on a journey through pain and death into life and joy. This Lent at Christ Church our guidebook on the journey will be *The Book of Joy: Lasting Happiness in a Changing World*, by Archbishop Desmond Tutu, the Dalai Lama, and Douglas Abrams. During Lent, we will focus on themes from the book during our adult forums on Sundays. Our Wednesday evening worship will incorporate practices described in the back of the book, and the Thursday book group will be reading and discussing the book.

*The Book of Joy* follows a week-long conversation with the two leaders who, despite years of exile and oppression remain among the most joyful people on earth. They explore the emerging science around joy and the practices we use to cultivate and set up obstacles to it.



Among the obstacles to joy are fear, adversity and anger. As the Archbishop said, “People would like to be able to take a pill that makes their fears and anxiety go away...this is impossible...one must have mental immunity...[and] it takes time to develop.

That immunity is cultivated by practicing the eight pillars of joy: Perspective, Humility, Humor, Acceptance, Forgiveness, Gratitude, Compassion, and Generosity.


**Perspective** – “For every event in life, the Dalai Lama said, there are many different angles. When you look at the same event for a wider perspective, your sense of worry and anxiety reduces, and you have greater joy.”

**Humor** – Archbishop Tutu said that “...when we were conducting funerals of people killed by the police...people were really angry and you’d have the police not standing far away – and it was an explosive situation...my weaponry, if you can call it that, was almost always to use humor, and especially self-denigrating humor.”

**Generosity** – “We are fundamentally good. The aberration is not the good person; the aberration is the bad person. We are made for goodness. And when we get opportunities, we mostly respond with generosity.”

Please join us this Lent on an exploration to discover the joys this life can offer and the joys we can offer to others.



### 2017 Mission and Ministry Grants

The Endowment Committee has awarded these Mission and Ministry Grants for Spring 2017:

**Outreach-Financial Peace University** - **\$1,500.00** awarded for a special one-time project to fund expenses and scholarships for the presentation of the personal finance course. Kurt Ellison, administrator, is the project coordinator. Kurt will lead a group of parishioners who will teach the course over several weeks to build attendees' knowledge and skills in personal finance.

**Special One Time Project-CenMoCo Youth Council** - **\$1,500.00** awarded for a special one-time project to our new Diocesan regional group Central Montgomery County (CenMoCo) to fund the start-up of a regional youth council for our 10-member parishes to use a resource for youth activities at the parish level and regional level. Madi Chase, youth minister, and Emily Guthrie, rector, are the project's coordinator.

**Special One Time Project-Music New Choir Robes** - **\$2,250.00** awarded for a special one-time project to purchase 10 new robes for choir members. Teddy Guerrant, organist and choir master, is the project's coordinator.

**Kitchen Renovation** – **\$1,500.00**. This application requested authorized use of previously approved grant for a kitchen designer to plan and recommend new kitchen cabinets to replace old, broker cabinets in the kitchen. Gail Marks, Vestry member-Parish Life, is the project's coordinator.

## Rector's Reflections



From the 1<sup>st</sup> century onward, one of the core questions for the followers of Jesus is this: How do we make choices, live out our lives, in ways consistent with the teachings and example of Jesus? How is our faith relevant to our current reality? These are deeply challenging questions, especially because a centerpiece of Jesus' teachings embraced the prophetic call to serve the least among us. Arguably his core teaching – the Sermon on the Mount (or Plain!) - turned **every** notion of power on its head then and now. Jesus was neither meek nor mild. He confronted both the religious and political leaders of his day, and paid the ultimate price for doing so.

We can't get away from the implications of following Jesus. He begs us to ask ourselves heart rendering questions; for example, 'what does it mean that we welcome Jesus when we welcome the stranger'? When we open our hearts and arms to the "unclean" of our day – the modern equivalents of prostitutes, tax collectors and lepers? These were not apolitical questions then, and they are not now. But we cannot avoid asking the questions *and* figuring out responses as followers of Christ, as a church, as a denomination.

OK, that brings me to our church community, our expression of the Jesus Movement here in Kensington. Our faith confronts us and calls to us no matter what our contemporary political affiliations. So how do we love one another, listen to one another, extend mercy to one another in the community? How do we lovingly hold each other accountable to the mandates of our faith?

It's always difficult to preach the Gospel, and it's impossible to preach the Gospel without offending anyone. The gospel is simply too powerful. Of course, I bring my own history, lens, blind spots and passions. We each have those. (Clearly God loves diversity!) Here's what I can assure you: I am not a mouthpiece for a particular political party or agenda. And I will not shy away from the implications of our faith for the common good. For example, it is impossible to preach the Gospel of Jesus, who according to the Gospel of Matthew was himself a refugee, without asking myself and you what it means for us to welcome the stranger. Without asking myself and you what it means to be compassionate neighbors to our Jewish, Muslim and immigrant brothers and sisters. Without asking myself and you 'what would Jesus do?' and wrestling with the answer(s) that we hear in our hearts and souls and minds.

Bishop Gene Sutton of the Diocese of Maryland sent out a pastoral letter that discussed in part the difficulty of negotiating how to preach and how to listen to sermons as well as how to have conversations with one another about faith, politics, and the current climate. . In it he reiterated his guidelines for preachers and listeners. I hope you'll join me in *attempting* to follow them!

### *A guideline for preachers*

- ◆ Always preach the gospel. Respect the pulpit; don't view it as your personal political platform.
- ◆ Speak as *one* informed witness to Christ's gospel, acknowledging there are other witnesses.
- ◆ Remind your listeners that this is the beginning of a conversation you want to have with them, not the end of a needed conversation.
- ◆ Show some courage. It's easier in the long run for your pastoral ministry than cowardice.

Be willing to listen, be willing to change your mind, be willing to repent.

### *A word to listeners*

- ◆ Cut your preachers some slack. They really are trying to say and do the right thing.
- ◆ Acknowledge in yourself that Jesus was both a spiritual and a political teacher.
- ◆ Read the cited Scriptures, and have the conversation with God and with others that the preacher is inviting you to have.

Be willing to listen, be willing to change your mind, be willing to repent.

## Music Notes

Once again, it seems that I am thanking someone for something ("yea a joyful and pleasant thing it is to be thankful!"). This time I am again grateful for another generous gift from our Endowment Fund committee, headed by Ted Seale, for ten new choir robes. One of the weak areas I identified upon arriving at Christ Church was the condition of our choir robes, not to mention that our choir has grown in numbers from 8 to about 20 at present. Almy is having a 15% off sale on choir robes (choir robes are not cheap -- they average about \$225 per robe), so we are able to order these new robes while even saving a little money at the same time!



Progress continues to be made on our sanctuary Knabe grand piano (through another generous gift from anonymous donors). Our piano technician, Joyce Meekins, has installed a touch rail system to lighten the action, and continues to regulate and adjust the mechanism to make the instrument more responsive and user-friendly. She has also installed a short stick so that we can raise the lid part-way without having to raise it to its full height (thereby blocking the choir when they sing from the chancel steps). The downstairs Kawai studio piano now has a lock for its keyboard so that we may better monitor and control who plays it (the key is available from the church office).

Our harpsichord has also had some much needed repairs by Mark Adler, and will be played some during Lent (particularly during the preludes to the 10 a.m. service) as a quieter way to meditate and reflect during this holy season.

I remain thankful for this loving, supportive, generous church family.

March promises to be a reflective but active month for the youth of Christ Church.

News from the Library!




**The Book of Psalms mystery series** by Kate Charles has arrived and is being enjoyed. We hear from some that they cannot put the book down.



## PrimeTimers

The Prime Timers will meet **the second Thursday of March, March 9th**, in order to accommodate our special speaker. The topic will be the remarkable Lilly Stone.

The Power Point presentation is based on the speaker's 2012 book (available for sale and signing). The book states that Lilly Stone's life "...covered nearly a century of change. She was born during the Civil War, and she died during the Cold War. In her lifetime, women got to vote, rural areas became suburbs, housing development and industry replaced farms, dirt roads were paved, and highways cross-crossed the land. At the stage of her life when most people retire, and at time when women stayed at home, Lilly was not only doing men's work, but starting and operating an industry of men's work. In 1924, she ran a business generally considered "men's work" operating a quarry in Bethesda and remarkably, World War II brings German POWs to work in her quarry.



This is a story of a strong-willed woman whose contributions impacted the social, cultural and economic life of her time."

Curry says: "On Episcopal Relief & Development Sunday, we focus on how we engage life and the world more deeply, to truly heal a hurting world, to truly pray and work for social, economic and environmental justice and to truly respond to acute human suffering. I invite everyone across our Church, as our Prayer Book says, to the observance 'of a holy Lent by prayer, fasting and self denial,' and by works of compassion, justice and mercy, like those carried out through Episcopal Relief & Development."

### Throughout the six Sundays of Lent:

**Chapel assistants Cynthia Winder and Barbara Ferry** will join Ann Enkiri to offer meaningful, community-building gathering activities and worship experiences at Children's Chapel. We will explore some beautiful symbols of Lent, shared with our parish community on posters: Sand, Rock, Human Being, Light, Shell, and Seeds.

Our Sunday School teachers are busy preparing their lessons for the weeks ahead. **Godly Play teachers Karen Fowle and Stephanie Feller** will be teaching about Jesus' life and his actions as healer, teacher, and savior through the Faces of Easter Lessons.

**Living the Good News teachers Kitty Shuler, Liz Quinn, Shannon Finn and Ann Enkiri** will focus on major Gospel themes as we read and learn about Jesus resisting temptation in the desert, inviting Nicodemus to be born anew, offering living water to a Samaritan woman, restoring vision to a blind man, raising his friend Lazarus to life, suffering and overcoming his own death to rise on Easter Sunday.

On **Easter Sunday**, Children's Chapel features the **Easter Egg homily** as a way to revisit Jesus' life and teachings. After the 10 AM Service, children of all ages enjoy an **Easter Egg Hunt** organized by our CCPK Youth as the parish gathers for a celebratory Easter Reception.

**"Agnes the Lamb"** sits patiently every year during the Lenten season on the Outreach table waiting for people to "feed" her so she can continue the work of **Heifer International** with their philosophy of "teach a man to fish" that inspires our work to end world hunger and poverty throughout the world once and for all.
