## Engaging Members on Policy Issues

The past year has brought a lot of uncertainty to health care policy. Here is a brief review of health care events since October 2016:

**October 2016:** Polls indicate Hillary Clinton should win presidency which means that the ACA (Affordable Care Act) will be tweaked, improved, and expanded

**November 2016:** Republicans sweep the election and many Washington insiders expect ACA repeal on day one of Trump presidency with a replacement to come later

**February 2017:** Republicans now looking to repeal and replace the ACA at the same time, they hope to pass legislation by the summer

**May 2017:** House passes The American Health Care Act just weeks after their first iteration failed

**July 2017:** Senate fails to pass their version of repeal and replace The Better Care Reconciliation Act

**September 2017:** Senate reignites repeal and replace debate with Graham-Cassidy but that effort falls short

**October 2017:** President Trump ends “CSR” Cost Sharing Reduction payments and signs healthcare executive order

As you can see, we have had a lot of politics and policy to grapple with over the past year. Simultaneously, RHCs had to deal with:

- new emergency preparedness regulations and guidelines;
- an evolving “Care Management” or CCM benefit;
- a frustrating (see: CG Modifier) HCPCS reporting rollout, and;
- confusion over all the “acronym policy” (my term) - MACRA, MIPS, PQRS, APMs, and the QPP.

In order to refine the RHC voice in this growing list of issues, earlier this year, we decided to form a “NARHC Policy Committee.” Our goal was and still is to foster better communication between the NARHC and members on all aspects of policy from lawmaking to rulemaking to guidance.
