Cost: \$140 for overnight guests, \$55 for commuters


Price for commuters includes dinner and lunch; Price for overnight guests includes single room accommodations with private bath and all meals.

Our faith is full of heroes who experienced God powerfully in solitude. From Hagar and the Hebrew prophets to Jesus in the wilderness to Francis of Assisi and Catherine of Siena, we see how escape from the toil and temptations of daily life can open our eyes, ears, minds, and hearts to the still, small voice of God. In the vast desert or a tiny room, solitude—frightening for some and a welcome reprieve for others—is far from an antisocial self-indulgence but rather is an opportunity for transformation and empowerment to serve God’s people ever more deeply.

Join priest and author Heidi Haverkamp for a time of “solitude together” as Lent begins, with a focus on both time alone and time together in conversation. Choose one date to attend, and either stay overnight or commute.

Heidi Haverkamp is a writer, a preacher, a retreat leader, and an Episcopal priest. For ten years, she served in parish ministry in churches in Chicago and Bolingbrook, Illinois. She is a Benedictine oblate at Holy Wisdom Monastery in Wisconsin. Her first book, *Advent in Narnia: Reflections for the Season* was published in September 2015 by Westminster John Knox Press. She received her M.Div. from The University of Chicago Divinity School in 2006 and a certificate in Anglican studies from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary (now Bexley Seabury) a year later. She has also worked on organic farms, in a corporate law office, as pastor of a rural congregation in New England, and at Trader Joe’s. She married Adam Frieberg in 2008. They now live in DeKalb, Illinois, with two cats and a beagle, where they are thick in the renovation of a snug brick colonial.
