Astoria Warrenton Chamber History: 1951

In 1951, the Chamber supported an extensive $11" \times 17"$ 26-page promotional brochure touting the wonders of Astoria. The cover boasted "This is Astoria Oregon", but the reader soon understood that most pages included industry and businesses throughout Clatsop County.

The Astoria Chamber office was at the corner of 14th & Exchange Street. One page of the brochure was dedicated to the Chamber-sponsored Salmon Derby held August 30 through the Labor Day weekend.

The following are highlights from that 1951 brochure:

- Astoria is the 7th largest city by population in Oregon.
- \$30 million yearly from nine cannery plants, where a good tuna season catch of 33,000 tons aided in overall employment of 4,200.
- The Chamber estimated an additional \$30 million "buying income" from its population of 12,331.
- Astoria boasts 20 churches, two hospitals, two theaters, six public schools, a swimming pool, three parks, a library, and a 250 million-gallon water storage system.
- Three leading income industries: fishing, lumbering and agriculture.


