The plot begins with Ally, the main character, refusing to do work and creating clever, but disruptive distractions. A teacher recognizes a bright, creative student underneath the troublemaker and seeks to address Ally's feelings about her disability.

Fish in a Tree is provides a insight into the challenges facing students with disabilities as they attempt to maneuver through school. The book is a resource for teachers understand and nurture discussion among their students about living with and managing their own disabilities.

Managing the Cycle of Meltdowns for Students with Autism Spectrum Disorder

By definition, children and youth with ASD have significant social, communication, and behavioral problems and frequently experience difficulty in controlling their anger and other emotions. Educators and parents often find themselves in situations where students with ASD display meltdown behavior.

This book provides information and evidence-based strategies for planning for, responding to and managing the various phases of the meltdown cycle.

The book is divided into two sections. The first section provides background and details for understanding the meltdown cycle, the nature of meltdowns, the six phases and behavioral characteristics associated with each phase. The second section provides strategies for each phase, emphasizing safety, crisis management, re-entry, and follow up.

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How does a book study work?

This book study uses the online platform, Edmodo. You are expected to read the book and at the end of each chapter, you will log into Edmodo for your assignment. Each assignment has 3-5 questions that you will need to answer. You can work at your own pace; however, all of your responses must be completed by midnight on **Sept 5, 2017** to get credit.

Timeline: Registration and Payment is due by **June 10**. Starting on **June 14**, you will receive information on getting started. The book study must be completed by midnight on **Sept 5, 2017**.

Cost: Registration fee: is \$45 per book study and you must have access to the book. The books are available online or from the publisher. Register by completing the attached registration form.

Credit: All three books are approved 20 hours of ADE recertification credit. **Uniquely Human** and **Unlocking Literacy** are approved for 20 hours of DHS licensure credit for SLP/SLPAs.

Getting Started: On June 14, you will receive a Welcome email and be invited to join the book study group on Edmodo. You will receive information on how to navigate the system and timeline for completion. You can always get started earlier by ordering and reading the book.
