The annual meetings had some old and some new this year. The location, the tables, the chairs, the excellent food, the friendly atmosphere, the conversation between friends, and the focus on the Cadet ministry were all familiar components of Congress. The schedule, the focus on visioning, and the presence of the incoming Executive Director were all new. Steve Bootsma, the new ED, is now living and working in the United States and was able to be present at Congress after not being able to cross the border at the same time last year.

Steve gave a motivational address on the future of Cadeting, which lent itself to further discussion by each of the committees and during Friday evening dinner. Each of the councils was challenged to go out and start at least one new club in the next three years.

# Here is what came from Congress 2017.

- Being approved by Congress, certified counselors will now vote on changes to the CCC Constitution, including wording ensuring Cadets are boys and counselors are men, updating verbiage, and aligning the document with current best practices.
- Independent clubs may operate as Christian Cadet Clubs, still under the banner of the Calvinist Cadet Corps.
- Counselors may wear the first aid patch provided they have completed a recognized first aid training program. The Corps no longer limits the programs acceptable.

# Congress 2017 also turned down some proposals.

- A mandate that Corps activities not begin or end on a Sunday.
- Following a report on a previously requested further study, a 2014 proposal regarding an R•P•B merit badge on the Seven C's of Salvation.

With John Barneveld and Tyce DeBoer completing their terms, Ben Ritsema (Kalamazoo Council) and Todd Mulder (Rush Creek Council) were elected to terms on the Executive Committee.







While only the congressmen got to vote on the issues, many councils were also represented by their presidents, with all present interacting, learning, making new friends, and experiencing the size of the Cadet ministry. Even if you are not in one of those two roles, visitors are always welcomed at Congress, you may wish to consider coming to Grand Rapids on January 11–13, 2018 to experience Congress for yourself.



# **RTC Conference Overview**



The training coordinators of the various regions of Cadeting met January 12–14 in Grand Rapids, Michigan. If those dates sound familiar, it's because the RTCs met at the same time and place as the Cadet Congress. The two groups shared opening devotions, but each spent most of their time accomplishing their own agenda.

For the trainers, that meant dealing primarily with these issues:

- RTC Job Description. The men looked closely at what the job description says they should be doing. They compared that to which duties they are, in fact, actually performing. They had serious discussions about how they could best accomplish the things that ought to be done. The goal was to simplify duties and to do them.
- DCE Training. RTCs studied exactly what is being taught in each of the four sessions for the three phases twelve training sessions in all. They were asked to evaluate the worth of everything that is taught, and to seek more effective ways to get the material across. As DCEs know, they have three separate aspects to their job. They are to be...
  - -detectives, figuring out what their counselors need to be trained in,
  - -developers, designing workshops that meet the needs of the men, and
  - -deliverers, presenting those workshops in an effective manner.
- The RTCs confirmed their belief in the value of this type of program, and reworked the training. There will be less stress on workshop evaluation, though it will still be there. There will be more stress on the effective delivery of workshops, where the counselors will most notice it.
- DCE Manual. Changing the training meant adjusting the manual. In another effort to simplify, plans are to lower the number of tabbed sections from 15 to 12, and to organize them in a more sequential and understandable fashion.
- Intra-regional Communication. On Friday afternoon, the RTCs met with congressmen and presidents from their regions. They used that time to confirm exactly who is and who is not an active DCE in each council. Then they asked for "best practices," and there was a good amount of feedback. They were focusing on what types of learning experiences take place outside of normal council meeting workshops. Responses included offering a trip to Home Depot for training, a series of Saturday morning (offering multiple time slots and multiple workshops in each one) father and son activities, and more. Finally, RTCs asked the men to keep in touch and to tell them what they can do to help the council boards.

# **Executive Director's Report**

# Steve Bootsma January 12, 2017

Yes, it really is me giving this report. After being introduced as the incoming Executive Director at Congress 2015, and then not being able to attend Congress 2016 at all, I now stand before you to give an update on what has been happening in the Corps office over the past 12 months.

First, I would be remiss if I did not publicly thank Dick Broene for his work over the years. In March 2014 it was announced that he was planning on retiring, and for the next 24 months he stepped up as necessary to keep Cadets moving forward. His patience and flexibility as I waited to be able to start, doing whatever needed to be done, was often behind the scenes, but should not go unnoticed. Thank you, Dick, for all that you have done for Cadets and for making it easier for me to move into the role.

It has been a busy year for me, as each task I approach is being done 'the first time'. I am continually asking "Why?" as I attempt to understand what gets done in the office and how the best way to handle it is. Some things are being changed; some things are being left as is. I've been doing a lot of digging in archives to see what needs to be done in a certain manner and what is done by tradition. If something changes and you don't understand the rationale for the change, or if you don't like the change, please note that it is not a personal attack. I am not changing things just to say that I've changed it, but change is being made in a continuous attempt to make improvement. If you would like to talk about things, I can regularly be found in the office, or spoken with over the phone, or can communicate via email. The door, literal or virtual, is almost always open.

I have visited a number of councils over the past year and have really enjoyed getting to meet with the counselors in these different locations. Hearing the stories and seeing the work being done in our organization is encouraging.

### Staff

Over the year there have been some changes to our Corps staff. As you know, Kathy Door passed away suddenly last April. She had been a member of our staff for over 20 years. We know she is rejoicing with our Father in heaven, but we miss her, and all that she did for Cadets, in the office.

In August we welcomed Sarah Stuitje to the office. She's not the "new Kathy" in that the job description has been revamped. The position title for the desk in the corner has been changed from Executive Secretary to Office Manager / Assistant Designer. Sarah comes with a degree in graphic design and experience in retail management and she has been a wonderful addition to our staff.

Bob, Mary and Kim stepped up to the challenge this spring and summer. Putting in extra hours, taking on additional tasks and responsibilities, working outside of their comfort zones, all while dealing with a new boss, they managed to get everything done that needed doing. Publications were out on time, merchandise was ordered and sold, and the wheels didn't fall off the bus

### **Camporees and Conventions**

With no Camporee until this coming summer, and no council stepping forward to host a convention, 2016 marked the first year in a long time that there was not an international Corps event. We are working with a few different groups and hope to see conventions planned for 2018 and 2019 again. Camp Elk Run plans are coming together and we look forward to seeing all of you in South Dakota this summer. Camp 2020 doesn't have an official name yet, but we look forward to gathering in Northern Michigan at that time. Camps for 2023 and beyond are not set yet.

### **Mandates**

Congress last year gave a number of mandates to be worked on.

- 1. Review the purpose of merit badges in the CCC. The Executive Committee will study a report, created by the ED, early in 2017.
- 2. Counselors must be certified in order to vote on Corps affairs. This was passed by Congress and subsequently received the approval of more than the two-thirds of active counselors required.
- 3. Seven C's of Salvation merit badge. The 2014 Congress sent this proposal back to the Executive Committee for further study. This will be reported on tomorrow afternoon.
- 4. Mushrooms and Fungi merit badge. This was completed and is now included in the recently released version of the R•P•B Guidebook.

- 5. Electricity merit badge. The updates were completed and are now included in the recently released version of the *R•P•B Guidebook*.
- 6. Snowshoeing merit badge. This was completed and is now included in the recently released version of the *R•P•B Guidebook*. This prompted some updates to the Snow Skiing badge as well.
- 7. Creation merit badge. This was completed and is now available on-line. It will appear in the Spring issue of the *Clarion*.

### **Training**

As part of the changeover in the ED position, a review of the training needs of the Corps is going to be done. The review has not been completed. Currently Dick Broene is acting as the Training Coordinator.

I ask each of you, presidents and congressmen, to encourage the counselors of your council to participate in the training opportunities that they have: attending council meetings, going to regional training conferences, or being trained as a DCE to further work within your council.

As a Corps we recognize the value of having trained counselors. The Counselor Certification Course is now available on-line. A counselor, working on his own, on his computer, over several blocks of time, can complete the course. There is still benefit in having the course led by a DCE, with opportunity for group discussion, but this opens up the ability for independent clubs, and others who can't make local council meetings, to become certified as well.

### **Program, Publications and Promotions**

Prayer emails, Clarion, DCE Connection, Independent Update, Cadeting Today, and Cadet Quest all continue to be produced.

Some of these publications have undergone style and/or content changes. More changes are yet to come.

Bible lesson materials are being updated to use the newest version of the NIV. We are updating the look and feel of some of our older materials.

A new form was created in regards to submitting Badge Proposals. This is used for suggested updates to existing badges as well as suggesting new badges. The forms were emailed in the spring and included in the fall issue of the *Clarion*.

There are some new items for sale, check out the store on your break to see some samples and order some gifts for your Cadets.

### DYM

The CCC is one division of an entity named Dynamic Youth Ministries. DYM serves us, <u>GEMS</u> and <u>Youth Unlimited</u> with facility, mailing, printing, payroll and administrative services.

Youth Unlimited has undergone some staffing changes of their own this past year, but continue to focus on providing week-long mission experiences for middle and high school age students. They passionately strive to help youth leaders challenge youth to commit their lives to Jesus Christ and transform this world for Him.

GEMS has been without an Executive Director for most of the past year. We pray for our sister organization as they continue on. Their ED Search Committee is nearing a decision, and we look forward to being able to welcome their new leader shortly. [Editor Note: As of February, GEMS has hired a new Executive Director and she started February 15, 2017.]

Effective March 1, 2017 DYM will expand to four divisions. The Esther School, started by GEMS as a ministry in Zambia, has continued to grow, so much so that they were beginning to overwhelm the GEMS administration. TES will be launched as its own entity, a fourth branch of DYM. This will have a minimal positive impact on the Cadet finances. It will increase the size of the DYM board.

The Ministry Team of DYM consists of the leaders of the four divisions. Effective March 1, I will be taking on the role as Ministry Team Lead for a two-year term. With the changes in leadership for Cadets and GEMS over the last several years, Jeff Kruithof, ED of YU, has been acting as the MT Lead for 5 years. I personally thank him for all that he has done in helping me adapt to my role, and for the work he has done with GEMS during their time without a director.

We continue to look for ways in which all of our divisions can work together. Investigation is being done into potentially sharing a theme for the 2018-19 program year.


### **Statistics**

Numbers can be used to show almost anything, and our ministry is not all about numbers. Yet we do like to see how things are going. These statistics do not include the clubs located in Kenya.



# **Independent Clubs Report**

Greetings from the Independent Cadet clubs in the United States, Canada, Uganda East Africa, and Transcarpathia, Ukraine. God has been good to us, and we thank Him for the blessings given to our Independent Clubs as well as to this organization.

Currently we have 84 Independent clubs, 57 in the United States, 24 Canadian clubs, one in Uganda, East Africa, and one in Transcarpathia, Ukraine.

We have gained 6 Independent clubs this year! Two new clubs were added — West Town Community in Georgia, and Bethany Reformed in Minnesota. Four clubs were re-activated, 2 in Michigan, one in Kansas, and one in Nova Scotia. Last year, we lost one club in Michigan, Fellowship Reformed Church, who went with Christian Service Brigade. We also lost Northland Home School club with Stone Junod, and we prayed for him as he decided between Cadets and Boy Scouts. However this past summer we gained a new club in its place — Northland Christian Church in Kansas, with Stone Junod as head counselor.

Again this year I communicated with the Independent clubs in various ways, with the Internet being the fastest and most efficient way. I wrote and Corps published three editions of the *Independent Update* — fall, winter, and spring — to keep counselors informed. I also sent out reminders to clubs which haven't sent in club registrations or offerings to the Corps office.

LaVonne and I sent out a Thanksgiving message to all our Canadian Independent Clubs on October 9th, and we sent another Thanksgiving message to our U.S. clubs on November 23th. We also sent a Christmas message "FROM OUR HOUSE TO YOURS" with a picture of LaVonne and I with our 4 grandchildren, taken just before Christmas Eve. It was great to receive messages from various parts of the world in return.

In 2016, the Corps office sent out 11 information packets to those who would be Independent clubs. I followed up with them by sending a letter or email.

I would like to thank the office staff, Steve, Mary, Kim, Bob, and Sarah for all they do to make my job easier, and make the *Independent Update* look so good.

Personally I thank God for His support, and for my health and strength. And to all of you, for your support and prayers given to all our Independent clubs. Thank you for the gift of a new computer I received last spring — I have to say it is faster. We ask that you continue to pray, and where possible, reach out to the Independent clubs near your area. Thank you to those who have included them in your functions.

I leave you with a thought called "Personal Mission." When working with your boys, find out what their dreams are. God placed them here for a reason. How can you be an encouragement to them and their dreams? Don't be boring! Create something new with them, to make their world a better place, for they are the future of our world.

If any one speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. 



# **Image Transfer to Wood**

### **Materials**

Wood Board — since you will be using a copier print image, a piece of board that is about  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  or larger works well.

Liquitex Gel Medium (craft store)
Mod Podge (craft store)
Laser print on paper
Cloth rag
Sponge brushes

Sand paper

Stain

Picture hanging hardware

You have to plan to do this project over a couple evenings, but without too much effort the results are something the boys can be really proud of.

In the week or two before you plan to do this project, have the boys bring a photo or digital file that they want to transfer to wood. Upper body portraits of individuals or a small group work best. You lose a little detail in the photos when you transfer them to the wood, so photos with a lot of small details — where people or things are just a small part of the photo don't create a strong image on the wood. You may want to take your own camera and take portrait shots of each boy in the cadre to use for the project, or, as part of the photography merit badge, have the boys take photos of each other or another subject that they are interested in.

Your next step is to take the photos and have laser copies made of them. This takes a little thought because, first, you want to have a copy that will fit on the block of wood that you plan to use, and second, when you transfer to wood you will be creating a mirror image of your laser copy, so you may want to use your computer to scan (if you don't have a digital file), resize, and mirror the photos. Most office supply stores can make laser copies of photos for a reasonable price.

You can use an ink-jet copy but ink-jet images do not transfer as well and the images will appear faded. It is recommended that you use laser copies — either B&W or color — for the strongest image. Also, make the copies on standard white copy paper (nothing heavy or fancy) because you will later be removing the paper with a wet rag as part of the process.

Smooth out any air bubbles

Clear pine board, or a thin plywood with a clear, light, veneer works well for the wood base. At your first meeting have each boy cut and sand the edges of his wood board so it will look sharp when hanging on a wall. Once the wood is all prepped — sanded and clean spread the gel medium over your surface where you want the image transferred. Be generous with the gel. The gel will tend to be absorbed into the wood in places, especially if using a softer, more porous wood. So look over the surface once the gel is applied to see if there are any dry spots. The gel does not dry very quick, so run your brush across it several times to make sure the wood is coated with an even, smooth coat. It's probably good to have the boys just sit and watch you do it first, so they get an idea of how to apply this gel. A good coat of gel is the most important part of making this project a success.

Once you are happy with the gel coating on your wood, lay your laser copy face up on a clean flat surface and place the wood block with the gel surface down on your print. Then flip your block over and smooth out any air bubbles or lumps of gel. Now it needs to dry for 24 hours — so set the project aside until next meeting.

The next step is to take a wet rag and rub gently over the paper surface. The paper will slowly begin to peel off leaving your image transferred on the board. There is no need to press down hard to get the paper to peel off. If you press too hard you may damage the image. The wet paper will tend to "pill" up and you can just brush it off your transfer.

Let your transfer dry for about 10 or 15 minutes and then apply a coat of Mod Podge for a clear protective coating.

For some finishing touches you may want to stain the sides and back of the wood block and place some hanging hardware on the back so it can be hung on the wall.

# **Cadet Savings Bank**

There is always a need for financial resources to make some events and programs happen for the boys in your Cadet ministry. Inform the boys about the monetary needs of your club. Learning fiscal responsibility is part of growing up as well as social, physical, and spiritual maturing. Encourage the boys to play a part in making these events happen — and I don't mean by just asking their parents for money. A great way to remind them that they need to step up to the plate is to have a visual reminder.

Here is a simple Cadet bank that they can set on their dresser or shelf in their bedroom where they can put their loose change or a spare dollar or two.

Start with a glass jar and lid. You can use a mason/canning jar or you can find generic jars of several different styles at craft stores. Buy some bright colored spray paint, some adhesive labels (at most office supply stores), and download a sample Cadet logo from the Cadet web site (<a href="http://counselors.calvinistcadets.org/submission-shelp/cadet-clip-art/">http://counselors.calvinistcadets.org/submission-shelp/cadet-clip-art/</a>).

This jar was spray painted and let to dry overnight. A sticker was designed using the Cadet logo clip art and the boy's name was added. Using a drill and small tin snips a slot was cut in the lid. Put it all together and you have a great Cadet savings bank.

# Creation



### **PURPOSE**

Through learning about creation, the boys will realize:

- 1. God made everything, He continues to make everything, and He will continue to sustain everything.
- 2. Creation was intentional, done with order, structure, and a plan.
- Everything God created is good, it is our sin that mars this.
- Man was specially created in God's image, and we have a special role.

### **LEARNING**

The Belgic Confession (Article 2) states that: We know God by two means:

First, by the creation, preservation, and government of the universe, since that universe is before our eyes like a beautiful book in which all creatures, great and small, are as letters to make us ponder the invisible things of God: God's eternal power and divinity, as the apostle Paul says in Romans 1:20. All these things are enough to convict humans and to leave them without excuse...

# Everything was created, is still created, and will be sustained.

- 1. We like to know who made everything that we see.
  - a. Genesis 1:1–2 says God created the heavens and the earth. The Spirit is noted to be present at the very beginning.
  - b. John 1:1–3 adds that Jesus was there and helped the Father and the Spirit with the creation. Jesus is described as the Word. The Word was present at the very beginning and is defined as being God and being with God. The intimate relationship between Father and Son is shown, and the fact that Christ was a part of creating all things is emphasized.
- 2. a. Psalm 139:13–16. God sees us even before we are born. He creates each individual and knows all about him or her while still in the womb. God knows everything that is going to happen, nothing happens that surprises God.
  - b. God continues to give us life, breath and everything else we need. If we did not have the continuing support of God we would be nothing. We are unable to exist without the ongoing will of our Father in heaven. God maintains not just our lives but also the life of every creature.
- 3. God has created everything, the stuff that is visible and the stuff that is invisible. God is in control of who is in power; He controls the activities of the world around us. God continues to maintain the seasons, the weather, the rivers and the stars.

## Everything was made with a plan.

- Hebrews 11:3 says this was done by God's command.
  He took nothing and turned it into everything. Creation
  was not something that occurred bit by bit, with things
  slowly becoming what they are today. Creation involved
  God taking nothing and forming it into the complex
  creatures, plants, rocks and planets that we now see.
- 2. At the time of creation God already had a plan for an eternal kingdom for us. God is not making things up as He goes. He has created this world and allows it to run according to His plans. He already knows how things end

# Everything that was made was complete and good.

- 1. God saw all that He had made, and it was very good.
- 2. As God created everything according to His plan, we can assume that it all matches His character and started off the way He wanted it to. God's will for our lives and for the entire creation is described as good, pleasing and perfect. One Timothy 4:4 confirms that everything God created is good and we are to be thankful for everything that He provides for us.

### People have a special place in creation.

- People did not evolve from some other form of life. God specifically created humans in His image. We were a planned creation, set here on earth to rule over the fish, birds, and other animals. Male and female were created, both in God's image, neither being more in God's likeness than the other.
- 2. God created us for a purpose. God's intention for us is to do the good works that He has planned for us. This is just further confirmation that we did not evolve into humans. We were created for a specific reason. God knows ahead of time what He has planned for each of us, what situations He will place us in, and how He expects us to relate to Him.

## **DOING**

- Self explanatory.
- 2. Do any two of the following projects.
  - a. This is a fairly straightforward option. If doing this as a cadre badge, each boy should make his own poster. Take a group picture and send it to info@ calvinistcadets.org.
  - b. If this badge is being done as a cadre, you could take them to a museum to look at fossils of extinct animals. Most museums will relay the message that the earth is billions of years old, which may or may not contradict the message the boys get from home, school and church. If you go to a museum, send pictures and information about your trip to info@ calvinistcadets.org. You may wish to have the boys look into animals that have become extinct more recently (e.g. dodo bird, passenger pigeon, golden toad, Pyrenean ibex) to realize that even now we are doing harm to the creation in a way that cannot be reversed.

c. God created us with minds that can think and envision beauty. We are different than other parts of creation in that we too, in turn, can create. The boys will likely find it difficult to come up with something truly unique, their animal will likely have features of other animals that they have previously come across.

Now that your cadets have completed this badge, you may wish to encourage them to do the Ecology or God's Temple badges. These two badges develop the theme of being good stewards of the creation that God has provided for us. Ecology deals with being mindful of the world around us, while God's Temple focuses on how we must care for ourselves, as we are a special creation of God, made in His image.

## Other suggestions

The church as a whole cannot agree on when creation occurred — was it created 10,000 years ago or is the universe 14 billion years old? Christians cannot agree on how to interpret the reading of Genesis 1 and 2 — were there six 24-hour periods in which everything was formed or are the passages poetic in nature advising us of the who and why of creation, but not the when and how?

The purpose of this badge is not to give the boys an answer to the scientific questions of creation. The badge is intended to help Cadets realize that our entire world is given to us as a creation gift from God.

If doing this badge as a cadre you may wish to stay away from Doing option 2 b), or they could work on this project individually at home. The boys can talk with their parents about how old the universe is and how long ago other species were present on the earth.

If the boys question you in regards to how old the earth is, you should mention that there are different answers to the question, depending on whom you ask. You can let them know what you believe is the correct answer, allowing for boys to have other answers based on what they learn at home and school. Make sure the boys realize that being a Christian does not depend on having the answer to such a question.
