PROF. DONNA NAGATA ON JAPANESE AMERICAN INCARCERATION + MENTAL HEALTH (3222 ANGELL HALL)

Following Japan's military attack on Pearl Harbor, 120,000 Japanese Americans were ordered into U.S. incarceration camps. Drawing on survey and interview findings, this talk will describe the psychological and mental health impacts of the wartime incarceration for Japanese Americans who endured the camps as well as for their adult offspring born after the war.

WHAT IS OPEN IN EMERGENCY?



We have a crisis of mental health in Asian American communities. Rather than trying to recalibrate our existing mental health approaches and resources to better engage race and Asian American experience, what if we started on the opposite end, with what wellness, unwellness, and care actually look like in Asian American lives? This multi-piece special issue of **The Asian American Literary Review** is an arts and humanities intervention that decolonizes mental health. Novel in form and approach, *Open in Emergency: A Special Issue on Asian American Mental Health* rethinks Asian American un/wellness through an original deck of tarot cards, a stack of handwritten daughter-to-mother letters, a foldout tapestry, a hacked DSM, and a treated pamphlet on postpartum depression.

ABOUT PROF. MIMI KHÚC

Mimi Khúc is a queer Vietnamese American scholar, teacher, and writer, and currently a Visiting Assistant Professor in Asian American Studies at the University of Maryland College Park. Her research and writing interests span mental health, race and religion, queer of color feminist critique, and Asian American motherhood. Her writings have appeared in *Black Girl Dangerous*, *Briarpatch Magazine*, *Powerlines*, among others. She is the guest editor of *The Asian American Literary Review*'s recently released *Open in Emergency: A Special Issue on Asian American Mental Health*.
