between our personal life and our public life – sometimes a good one and sometimes not.

It brought to mind an old cartoon in the **NEW YORKER** where two dogs are staring at a computer screen. One says to the other – *“on the internet, no one knows you're a dog.”* Well, not any more, and it will be that way with an ever increasing sophistication. The internet is getting smarter. Your business bona fides are becoming less what you say they are and more what your body of work is – and if you get it wrong the internet will out you. If you are a 73 year old Governor in a Southern state and you are trying to project a particular image ... well, you get the picture.

In that regard, the internet getting smarter is good for the consumer. It provides transparency. But it can also be intrusive. We are making hundreds of decisions each day where we are unwittingly giving up our privacy for the sake of convenience. You sure don't think it is a coincidence that you get five emails and a Facebook ad suggesting the same book you reviewed on Amazon the day before, do you? Since my wife reads this column to induce sleep, however, I should point out that those emails offering the two for one specials at **DIAMONDS GENTLEMEN'S CLUB** truly came out of nowhere.

During his talk, Graff asked a question – *“do you want your government do the same things that you let Facebook, Twitter and online retailers do?”* Of course not. But it does not matter, because they are doing it, and tomorrow they will be doing it more. The war against terrorism has to be balanced against our legitimate right to be free of government intrusion. The scarier something is, the easier it is to find a constitutional work around. “Every Day I’ve Got the Blues!”-- B. B. King

Mississippi Delta blues artists found a way to sing and play their way through the blues. For lawyers there is no easy antidote, but there are things we can and must do to address this plague upon our profession.

First, can we own up to the problem? According to a study by the **DAVE NEE FOUNDATION**:

- Lawyers are the most frequently depressed occupational group in the U.S. and are 3.6 times more likely to suffer from depression than non-lawyers.
- Only half of lawyers are “very satisfied or satisfied” with their work.
- 19% of lawyers suffer from statistically significant elevated levels of depression.
- 15% of people with clinical depression commit suicide and lawyers rank fifth in incidents of suicide by occupation.

Enough of these depressing statistics! But why all this depression among lawyers? For one thing, if you think about it, you will realize that we lawyers are paid to be pessimists. Seeing troubles as pervasive and permanent is a component of what the law profession deems “prudence”. Remember how professors stressed that contracts must be drafted to protect against the “bad man”? We are trained to look through the sweet talk into the evil heart of our adversary, always suspicious and preparing for that fight to the bloody death.

This pessimism, that is so adaptive in the legal profession, brings in its wake a very high risk of depression in personal life. For many of us it’s hard not to take it to heart or to home (Maybe I’m not going to make partner, maybe our profession is a racket, the spouse is unfaithful or the economy is headed for disaster!) We face a great challenge, often unmet, to remain prudent and still put a firewall between this tendency outside the practice of law.

Other factors explain the high depression rate among lawyers: High job demands coupled with low decision latitude; the way that American law is becoming increasingly a “win-lose game”; and the inescapable, grueling pressure of much of the practice of law where we must carefully shepherd deadlines and always worry – even in a cold sweat at 3:00 AM – about doing the best and the right thing for the client. Of course, the matter of the overbearing or uncooperative client is another whole area perhaps beyond the scope of this discussion.

Where’s the light at the end of this tunnel? The nature of our profession makes all of us susceptible to depression but there are things that we can do to push back. Can we counter this “zero – sum mentality” with more pro bono involvement, more mediation, therapeutic justice and, God forbid, a little bit of chivalry in the midst of the fray? Can we have our cake and eat it too – retaining the virtues of the adversarial system while being happier lawyers?

Most importantly, in a spirit of professionalism, can we be more closely attuned to those lawyers among us who are truly suffering? An insidious aspect of depression is a person’s inability to self-motivate or to reach out for help. Are we finally beyond the era in which mental health problems were a disgrace and cause for ostracism? Are we ready to throw out a lifeline where it’s needed?

With the right kind of help, many lawyers have been able to overcome depression. Your Lawyer Assistance Committee is available on a confidential basis to help you or your colleagues in every way possible.

SIGNIFICANT DECISIONS

In a case of first impression, the Court of Civil Appeals in *State Department of Revenue v. Omni Studio, LLC*, No. 2140889 (Ala., April 29, 2016), held that no sales tax was due on incidental sales of photographs by a photographer whose primarily business was the rendition of professional photography services.

Reaffirming well-established but sometimes forgotten jurisdiction, the Supreme Court in *Ex parte North American Adjusters, Inc.*, No. 1150278 (Ala., April 22, 2015), held that a plaintiff could not withdraw a demand for jury trial without the consent of the defendant, at least where the defendant was not in default.

Continuing a line of consistent decisions involving the procedural details surrounding wrongful death actions in Alabama, the Supreme Court in *Ex parte Bio-Medical Applications of Alabama, Inc.*, No. 1150352 (Ala., July 15, 2016), held that when a wrongful death action was filed by a child of the decedent who had not been appointed as personal representative and the two-year statute of limitations expired, the complaint could not be amended to substitute the other child who had validly been appointed as personal representative. Accordingly, the complaint was dismissed.


