March Worship Theme: Paradox

As UUs, how do we find spiritual connection through paradox?

I have two favorite quotes. The first is by Albert Einstein.

“There are only two ways to live your life.

One is as if nothing is a miracle.

The other is as if everything is a miracle.”

The second quote, I see often on social media but I can't find who originated it. It simply says,

“Relax, nothing is under control!”

Both of these oddly bring me comfort. And I think that may be because, or perhaps why, I am a Unitarian Universalist.

Our faith calls us to explore the uncertainties of life and live into its contradictions. It calls us to be comfortable with ambiguity, so that we may grow and learn from our experiences and our relationships. It also calls us to tackle complex and often paradoxical social issues personally and as a religious community, so we can promote the common good and deepen our faith in humanity.

This month's worship theme is Paradox. Our question, ***As UUs, how do we find spiritual connection through paradox?***

Friends, some paradoxes are easier than others to wrestle with, and I suspect those will be different for each of us. Uncertainty can be extremely uncomfortable and challenging

Other News & Reminders

News from the Nominating Committee: Our Nominating Committee continues working diligently to assemble the slate of nine members who will search for our next senior minister. Please save the date, **Sunday, April 15**, to attend the congregational meeting at which we will vote on the Search Committee slate. It is important that all members be present at the meeting, to vote and learn next steps in the process.

From Rev. Joel Miller: If you've used the elevator at church, you may have noticed the many pictures and plaques on the walls around the elevator doors. One picture, hung on a wall that directly faces the elevator doors, is a print from an old painting that features the founder of Transylvanian Unitarianism, Francis Dávid (1510–1579). Francis David is pictured arguing for religious tolerance at the 1568 Diet of Torda. It's an important event for us as Unitarians: As a result of this gathering, the laws of a nation were changed allowing people, for the first time in history, legally to practice Unitarianism. (There had been Unitarians before this, but since it had been a crime punishable by death, few were open about it). It's the 450th anniversary of this legal proclamation, known as the "Edict of Torda." You can read more about it on the UU World website:
