### **President's Column**

#### **From the President of the Congregation**

Our congregation was touched last week by pain and tragedy—as you may already know, a young man tormented by a psychosis fatally injured himself at church in what his parents felt was a search for sanctuary from his terror. My wife asked me what a psychosis is, because I have worked with and known many people with psychosis or other symptoms of mental illness. The best short explanation I could give her is that it is the loss of an ability to tell the difference between what is real and what is imagined. If you have an active imagination, you can see how terrifying that could be.

After my initial shock and sadness in reaction to this tragedy, I took time to look at it through the lens of my role as President of our congregation. I thought back to our recent meeting of the Board of Trustees: specifically, our consideration of comments collected from our congregants during the Thrive Drive. They range from positive to negative — negative in the sense that people had experienced the pain of being treated badly here at church, which to me is totally unacceptable in any spiritual community. I (and I think my fellow board members) left that discussion with a strong sense of the importance and urgency of our work to build and nurture real community here.

This week's tragedy and pain are another reminder that we come to church to connect, to find strength and solace as part of our community. We find the comfort and safety to heal our wounds, and the opportunity to combine our gifts with others' to grow the strength we will need to build the Beloved Community here and in the world.

## **A Green Tip from Your Environmental Climate Task Force**

According to National Geographic "the energy that goes into the production, harvest, transportation, and packaging of wasted food produces more than 3.3 billion metric tons of carbon dioxide." Some ideas to keep that amount down include shopping wisely; don't buy more than you need just because the price is great. Learn when food really goes bad; the "sell by" dates are often just manufacturer suggestions for peak quality. Consider buying the odd shaped or discolored looking fruits and vegetables that are perfectly fine; other people may not and they may go to waste. Reuse, Recycle, Repurpose and buy apples that are a bit funky looking, but taste great.
