This past month I was the guest speaker at Edgewood's monthly luncheon. I spoke about church vitality, in the wider United Church of Christ and home at Edgewood. Often we rely on numbers of members or attendees and resources (buildings, money in the bank) to determine church vitality. I pointed us to other signs of vitality that are relevant whether you are a church with 30 or 3,000 people, and whether you are a congregation blessed with an abundance of resources or if you are worshipping in a borrowed space without a budget. One of the major signs of vitality that I lifted up is community engagement: does the neighborhood know the church is there? Does the church partner with local interfaith allies or have strong connections in their community? How often does the church leave their building and what does that look like?



June is a big month for community engagement at Edgewood. First we have Pride weekend where all Edgewood friends and members are encouraged to march in the Michigan Pride parade and then come to Pride Worship on Sunday morning. This year we are rejoicing for our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of being Open and Affirming and pledging 20 more years of a radical, faithful welcome for all people. This is a major opportunity to connect with and celebrate our LGBTQ community at Edgewood and in the greater Lansing area. Next Edgewood is embarking on a week of service. We are partnering with local service organizations in our area to learn more about their mission and lend a helping hand. This is a way to get to know our neighbors better and to live out our call to discipleship right in our own backyard. You'll find much more information in these pages – explore the Exchange and then join us in the community in June!

The Green Team is launching a new program this summer designed to get people outside to enjoy nature. The program, known as Edgewood Outdoors, will give people of all ages a chance to hike, bike, fish, kayak, canoe, swim and enjoy the outdoors. Please dress for the event and bring along water and sunscreen. In the event of bad weather, an event may be postponed or cancelled. Additional events are expected. Here are some of the programs being planned:

**Sunday, June 24: Fishing at Lake Lansing South.** Ben Pineda is organizing a fishing outing at Lake Lansing. Meet at Edgewood at 11:30 a.m. with a picnic lunch. Ben will provide fishing gear, bait and instruction. Children up to 15 can fish without a fishing license. Folks 16 and older will need a fishing license. The group will go to the Lake Lansing South park and fish off a dock. Ben has caught panfish, bass and pike at Lake Lansing. **Sunday, July 29: Pastor Liz Miller will lead a 25-mile "ice cream" bike ride,** probably in the direction of Mason. Meet at Edgewood at 4 p.m. with your bike and a bottle of water. More details to come.

# Racial Justice Task Force News

The Racial Justice Task Force is once more picking up a campaign in Ingham County that people at Edgewood started on some 40 years ago. In the mid-1970s, Frank Dennis, Robert Amundson, and Wendy Morrison helped to create and were office-holders of the Lansing Committee for Equal Justice, which was created to "establish a pre-trial release program, assisting the courts in pre-trial processing of criminal matters, and assure equal treatment under the law."

Frank has interesting stories to tell about progress that was made in the 1970s to divert people from jail if they could not afford to pay cash bail. There are some diversion courts that are keeping some people with substance abuse problems or who are veterans out of jail in Ingham County. But low-income people are still disproportionately being jailed when their richer neighbors would not be, simply because they don't have the money to put up bail.

Today, new tactics are being used to bring attention to this problem. In Lansing and in other cities across the country, a group called National Bail Out is supporting local groups to pay bail to help people get out of jail, rejoining the community before their court date.

Edgewood's Racial Justice Task Force held a quickly-organized fundraiser on May 6 when we learned that Black Lives Matter Lansing was planning a "Black Mamas Bail Out" for Mother's Day weekend. Edgewood folks and others gave generously, bringing in \$3,000. Many thanks!

The first woman was bailed out on May 10, with plans for a second one to get out of jail and come home the following week. Task Force members Judy Martin, Julia Grant, Heidi Thornley, or Chris Root can tell you more about it.

Many of us saw the movie "13<sup>th</sup>" last year at Edgewood. It documents powerfully the enormous increase in incarceration in our country and the long history of Black people being disproportionately locked up.

Bailing out a few individuals is an act of kindness, but we are also trying, once again, to figure out how to try to change the system of unfair cash bail. We've learned that Truman Morrison III, Truman and Eleanor Morrison's son, has been a national leader in this effort, having helped to do away with most cash bail in the court system in Washington, D.C.

Judy Martin has begun research about the Ingham County jailed and learned that 58% of the people who are there have not gone to trial – these people are locked up even though they are presumed innocent. And 48% of the people in that jail are Africa-Americans, although they are only 10% of the overall population in the county. Several of us are meeting to develop a research agenda and work with others in the area, including the Black Mamas Bail Out group, to develop a strategy to stop people from being put in jail simply because they can't afford bail.
