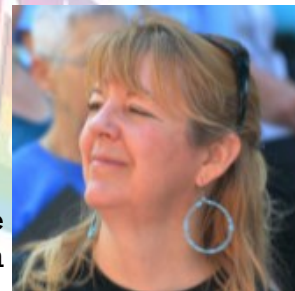
Music Notes

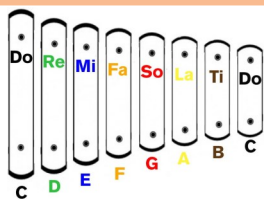
[Dr. Barnwell](#) (1946-present) wrote the lyrics to this stirring hymn entitled "We Are," that reaches in and grabs you in music and verse. An African American woman who came of age during the heart of the Civil Rights Movement, she was a longtime member of [Sweet Honey in the Rock](#), and has remained a committed Unitarian throughout her prestigious career. Working out of DC by way of New York, Dr. Barnwell combines her public health background with the arts through public service and amazing musical contributions as a musicologist, composer, arranger, lyricist, performer, singer, actress, writer, and "[Building a Vocal Community](#)" workshop coordinator.

Unitarian British poet and hymnist, Sarah Fuller Adams (1805-1848), is best known for penning the words to the hymn "Nearer My God to Thee." Friends with Elizabeth Barrett and Robert Browning, she was also an early women's rights advocate.

Béla Bartók (1881-1945) first began collecting songs from Eastern Europe, especially in his native Hungary, and felt compelled to secure as many styles and tunes as possible. He realized how quickly they were disappearing due to industrialization, globalization, homogenization, and war. Ahead of his time as a musicologist, he collaborated with Turkish composer Ahmed Saygun (1907-1991) to accomplish his goal. As an immigrant to the United States, his long-held Unitarian roots and progressive thoughts made for a difficult adjustment to his new homeland, but he was a faithful Unitarian for the remainder of his life.

Rev. Dr. Christopher Moore (1929-1987), was hired to start a children's choir for the [First Unitarian Church of Chicago](#), in 1956. There were 12 children in this first choir. The church wanted to publicly stand with the Civil Rights Movement and Rev. Moore was deeply committed to including young people from all areas of Chicago. He envisioned a multiracial, multicultural choir. He believed children could learn to understand each other by making beautiful music together. Today, this same choir that started in a small, simple way like every other children's church choir, draws members from every zip code in Chicago. The [Chicago Children's Choir](#) travels the world as musical ambassadors, and has over 3,000 young members. Participating in this choir as children has also had a profound impact on the lives of several UU Ministers!

It is easy to see the commonalities of these incredible musicians. Their love for humanity is inextricably connected to their love of music. It brings them to the certainty that music enlightens us and a conviction that acts of social justice can be propelled and directed through music and the arts. Music was the vehicle with which they worked to create lasting social change, and they all excelled in their fields. They never stopped working and growing as people or musicians. They did not let anything stop them from pursuing their goal and creed of bringing music and people together. These amazing artists inspire us daily in our work here at UUCL. With leaders like these, we can take courage as we work to grow as Unitarian Universalist musicians. Join the Music Program at UUCL and make your voice heard.

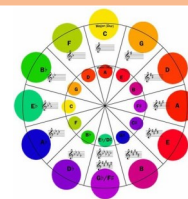


FREE Music Theory Class

Directly before Adult Choir Rehearsal, our Music Director Sally McCord will be offering this free class each Wednesday for UUCL members and their families (children age 12 and up). You will need to bring only a notebook, pencil, and your eyes and ears.

The Orff instruments will sometimes be used for demonstration. More advanced students who are relatively able to read music or understand intervals might wish to participate by being the assistant and playing the Orff instruments.

Basic sight reading and musical challenges will be provided, beginning with the absolute basics plus a little history of Western written music. We will progress each week throughout the semester and focus on the following areas: reading treble, ABC, and bass clef notation; recognizing and applying rhythmic notation; basic intervallic ear training and understanding the concepts of intervals; understanding the differences between major and minor intervals; understanding sharps and flats; understanding the concept of what "key" songs are written in; and the basics of scales and chords and how most of Western melody and harmony is created.

This is an interactive class whereby you will be asked to put rhythms into your body through movement and gesture, and you will be asked to sing and actively, intentionally listen. Join us for this great family activity which is also perfect for the teen or adult learner as well. We are never too old or too young to enjoy and benefit from the sacred wisdom that is Music!

Mentoring at Cardinal Valley Elementary Co-Chair

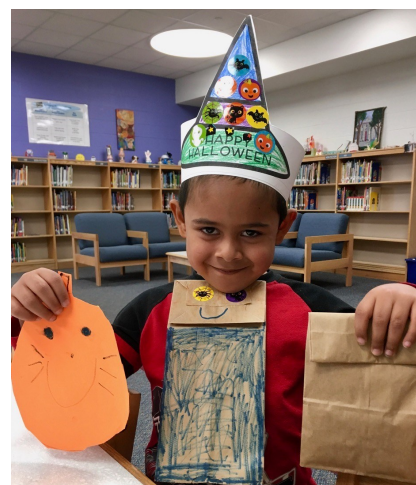


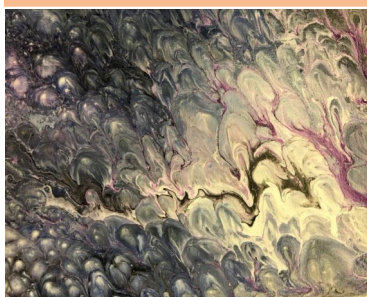
UUCL 's mentoring program at [Cardinal Valley Elementary](#) is going strong. Nineteen mentors are working with about 35 children, including 22 mentees, 3 children in a creative writing/art group, 8-10 chess club participants, and 1 "graduate" of the mentoring program who is now in middle school and continuing to meet with his mentor.

Mentors provide a variety of activities for the children. The overwhelming favorite among the children in the Fall was making slime, with mentors and mentees experimenting with a variety of slime recipes. UUCL mentors also helped with Science Night at the school.

Cardinal Valley teachers and child guidance specialists continue to tell us that the mentoring program makes a significant difference for the children involved, because the mentor is a consistent, caring adult in the child's life.

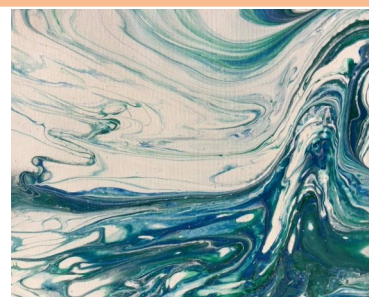
