

## Greening the Imagination

2. Refurbish and add more drinking water fountains on campus.

4. Urge the food court to have healthy vegetarian options. Invite farmer's markets and CSAs to campus.

6. Build a chicken coop and goat pen to help with the above. I can explain why chickens and goats are crucial for the future of our planet. (The Russian peasant was a lot smarter than us in many ways.)
7. Hire a certified organic gardener to work with facilities to eliminate toxic chemicals from the landscaping.
