MICHAEL L. WEHMEYER, PH.D

Dr. Michael L. Wehmeyer is the Ross and Mariana Beach Distinguished Professor of Special Education; Director and Senior Scientist, Beach Center on Disability; and, co-Director, Kansas University Center on Developmental Disabilities, all at the University of Kansas. Dr. Wehmeyer is the author or co-author of more than 350 peer-reviewed journal articles or book chapters and has been an author or editor for 35 books on disability and education related issues, including issues pertaining to self-determination, positive psychology and disability, transition to adulthood, the education and inclusion of students with severe disabilities, and technology use by people with cognitive disabilities. Dr. Wehmeyer is Past-President and a Fellow of the American Association on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (AAIDD); a past president of the Council for Exceptional Children's Division on Career Development and Transition; a Fellow of the American Psychological Association, Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Division (Div. 33); and Vice-President for the Americas and a Fellow of the International Association for the Scientific Study of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. He is former Editor of the journal Remedial and Special Education and is a founding Co-Editor of the AAIDD journal Inclusion. He is a co-author of the AAIDD Supports Intensity Scale and the 2010 AAIDD Intellectual Disability Terminology, Classification, and Systems of Supports Manual. He has been recognized for his research and service with awards from numerous associations and organizations, including, recently, the American Psychological Association Distinguished Contributions to the Advancement of Disability Issues in Psychology Award, the AAIDD Research Award, the Distinguished Researcher Award for lifetime contributions to research in intellectual disability by The Arc of the United States, the Burton Blatt Humanitarian Award from the CEC Division on Autism and Developmental Disabilities, and the CEC Special Education Research Award for 2016. Dr. Wehmeyer holds undergraduate and Master's degrees in Special Education from the University of Tulsa and a Master's degree in Experimental Psychology from the University of Sussex in Brighton, England, where he was a Rotary International Fellow from 1987 to 1988. He earned his Ph.D. in Human Development and Communication Sciences from the University of Texas at Dallas, where he received a 2014 Distinguished Alumni Award.

KARRIE A. SHOGREN, PH.D.

Dr. Karrie A Shogren is Professor of Special Education, Senior Scientist and co-Director of the Kansas University Center on Developmental Disabilities, and Associate Director of the Beach Center on Disability, all at the University of Kansas. Dr. Shogren's research focuses on self-determination and systems of support for people with disabilities as well as applications of positive psychology and strengths-based approaches to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Her current work focuses on the developing and researching the efficacy and effectiveness of assessment and intervention approaches for students with and without disabilities to promote self-determination with a particular focus on the role of these approaches in the transition to adult life and engagement in meaningful adult roles and responsibilities. Dr. Shogren has published over 85 articles in peer-reviewed journals, is the author or co-author of 10 books, and is one of the co-authors of *Intellectual Disability: Definition, Classification, and Systems of Support*, the 11th Edition of the American Association on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities' seminal definition of intellectual disability (formerly mental retardation) as well as the *Supports Intensity Scale-Children's and Adult Version*. Dr. Shogren has received grant funding from several sources, including the Institute of Education Sciences (IES) and National Institute on Disability, Independent Living, and Rehabilitation Research (NIDILRR). Dr. Shogren is co-Editor of *Inclusion and Remedial and Special Education*, and Associate Editor of *Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities and Research and Practice for Persons with Severe Disabilities*. She is a Fellow of the American Association on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities and has received the Council for Exceptional Children's Division for Research and the American Association on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Early Career Research Award. Dr. Shogren completed bachelor and master's degrees in psychology at Ohio State University and the University of Dayton, respectively, and her doctoral degree at the University of Kansas.

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JULIE JONES, PH.D., LMFT-S, LPC-S

Dr. Julie Jones serves in an administrative position as the Dean of Gateway Academy, a school where all students are identified with social and learning differences (www.thegatewayacademy.org). She is the Director of Counseling, Director of Research, lead coordinator for Educational Outreach, lead coordinator of alumni relations, and is a key stakeholder in the collaborative transitioning to adulthood program.

Dr. Jones is a published researcher. She is currently engaged in several research projects including a yearlong study on the impact of fitness on academic learning for adolescents with autism (with UTMB). Dr. Jones frequently speaks to local and national audiences on the outcomes of her research, including a new focus in 2017 on AD/HD and marriage.

Dr. Jones is the principal owner of a private practice in family therapy (www.jjonestherapy.org). She is considered an expert treating professional with specialties in AD/HD and autism. In addition, she has a long history of helping individuals manage extreme anxiety. She has advocated for and treated children with selective mutism for almost two decades. She currently supervises counselor interns and will teach counselors in training as an adjunct professor at the University of Houston-Clear Lake in 2017.
