A Few Words from Pastor Jennifer

John 12:20-36 – “Sir, we wish to see Jesus.”

²⁰ Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. ²¹ They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, “Sir, we wish to see Jesus.” ²² Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. ²³ Jesus answered them, “The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. ²⁴ Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. ²⁵ Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. ²⁶ Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. ²⁷ “Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—‘Father, save me from this hour’? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. ²⁸ Father, glorify your name.” Then a voice came from heaven, “I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.” ²⁹ The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, “An angel has spoken to him.” ³⁰ Jesus answered, “This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. ³¹ Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. ³² And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself....” ³³ ³⁶ After Jesus had said this, he departed and hid from them.

We’ve celebrated Christ the King Sunday, the official “end” to the church year. We are now in the season of Advent. The altar paraments will be changed to blue, the first candle banner will be hung from the sanctuary ceiling for Sunday, and the tree will soon be up as well. Around town, the street lights have been wrapped in evergreen and white lights, and our “Christmas Wonderland” neighbor on Spring Road already has their blow-up Christmas figures in their front yard, to my little boy’s extreme delight. The signs and rituals of the season are everywhere. Lovely signs, festive signs.

And yet.

And yet, this is the passage that keeps coming into my thoughts. And these are the words that whisper into my heart: “Sir, we wish to see Jesus.” On “Meet the Press,” incoming Chief of Staff, Reince Preibus, indicated that there are no current plans to create a registry of all Muslims in the US, but that he would not rule it out. “Sir, we wish to see Jesus.” In our Nation’s Capital, racial slurs and swastikas continue to be spray-painted on the walls of public buildings, and – in my hometown – even on the side of houses where minorities or Jewish people live. Our government and our people seem hopelessly divided. “Sir, we wish to see Jesus.” Language of “us” and “them” is ever increasing in our media, and we seem increasingly comfortable with making broad, sweeping assumptions about “THEM” (at least if the casual conversations I’ve overheard around town or been privy to on Facebook are any indication). “Sir, we wish to see Jesus.” And a recent news article I read announced that Chicago has had more shootings and gun-related homicides this year than New York and Los Angeles combined. “Sir, we wish to see Jesus.”

We are still raising our Christmas trees, and wrapping gifts, and baking cookies. We are still taking joy in the season, and it is right that we do. But I am mindful that for so many, these holiday trappings will do no more than put a thin veneer over deep, soul-searing questions. We are thirsty for the living water. We are hungry for the bread of life. And we need to see Jesus. (*continued next page*)

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Yet Jesus' answer to the Greeks in this passage (his answer to us) is a frustrating answer and an inadequate answer. An absurd answer, really.

But, we come anyway. We've heard the stories and, like the Greeks before us, we want to see for ourselves. Some of us have come a long way to get to this place in our lives. We're tired and road weary – soul weary – from the journey.

But, we come anyway. Because we've heard the stories. Water changed into wine. Chronically ill people made well. Thousands of hungry people fed off of five loaves and two fish. Walking on water. A man, blind from birth, being made to see. Amazing stories. Wondrous stories.

Well, now we want to see, Jesus. We want to see a sign of our own. And, instead, you speak to us of death, and of serving. You speak to us of being glorified and of being lifted up from the earth. You tell us that when you are lifted up in this way, all will be drawn to you. And then you hide: we won't see you again until you are nailed to the cross. We are thirsty for the living water; we are hungry for the bread of life. What sort of answer is this?

It is - quite simply - the most beautiful, amazing, and heartbreaking answer possible.

How difficult do we suppose it would be for the Word, which created the world, to walk on water? Probably not so very. Rearrange a few atoms and it should work well enough: an easy thing for the world's creator to manage, I'm sure.

But how difficult do we suppose it would be for the Word, king of the entire universe, to allow himself to come here? Allow himself to be born to a poor family under the cloud of scandal? To have to live as we do: subject to all the joy and pain that comes from being human? To allow himself to be arrested, imprisoned and killed? And all of it done willingly, all because of the deep, endless, passionate love he felt...and feels...for us? How many of us can sustain love on that kind of level? It is beyond comprehension.

Signs, no matter how big they are, no matter how wondrous they seem, exist in a moment and for a moment. Like a shooting star in the night, they create a bright glow, but vanish in the sparkling mist of morning. And this is not what Jesus' kingdom is about.

Jesus' kingdom is about something much more permanent: something much more important than an entertaining sideshow. Jesus' kingdom is about extravagant, irrational, no-holds-barred, self-giving and self-gifting kind of love. A love that WAS: in the beginning, with God. A love that IS: and is God. A love through which all things were made. A love that was and is and will always be the light of all people, because nothing else is strong enough – nothing else is enduring enough – to gather us all in from the dark.

There is darkness all around us, and we wish to see Jesus. And this is the good news that we can proclaim this Christmas season: the Word became flesh and lived among us in the person of Jesus. And we have seen his glory. And we get to see it again and again and again. We see it wherever and whenever we see extravagant, self-giving and self-gifting kind of love at work. Because that is the gift of light that Jesus gave to the world. It is the light that shines in the darkness. And the darkness does not overcome it.

Blessings to you and yours this Advent and Christmas season.

Want To Make A Difference This Year?

Required Minimum IRA Distributions (RMD's):

Why not save yourself the tax? Many retirees are required to take funds from their retirement accounts at age 70 1/2 but don't actually need these funds for their monthly living expenses. Here's one way to take those distributions TAX FREE:

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 first allowed taxpayers age 70½ or older to exclude from gross income otherwise taxable distributions from their IRA ("qualified charitable distributions," or QCDs), up to \$100,000, that were paid directly to a qualified charity. The 2016 Consolidated Appropriations Act has now made this a permanent benefit to all taxpayers. Not only are these funds donated to the church tax free, there may also be additional tax benefits as a result of the QCD.

Gifts of Appreciated Securities:

You can contribute securities tax-free. Securities that have appreciated in value may be donated to Epiphany, and you pay no capital gains tax on the securities you donate. Epiphany sells your securities and uses the proceeds for its mission and ministry. Did you know that Epiphany has a brokerage account to accept in-kind transfers of securities such as common stock, mutual funds and Exchange Traded Funds (ETF's)? By transferring to Epiphany, the securities are not sold until they reach Epiphany's brokerage account. The full amount is then tax free, and allows you to potentially use the full amount as a charitable donation/deduction on your tax return making this a win/win situation. Please consider this as part of your year-end tax planning. Please call the church office to help make this transfer.

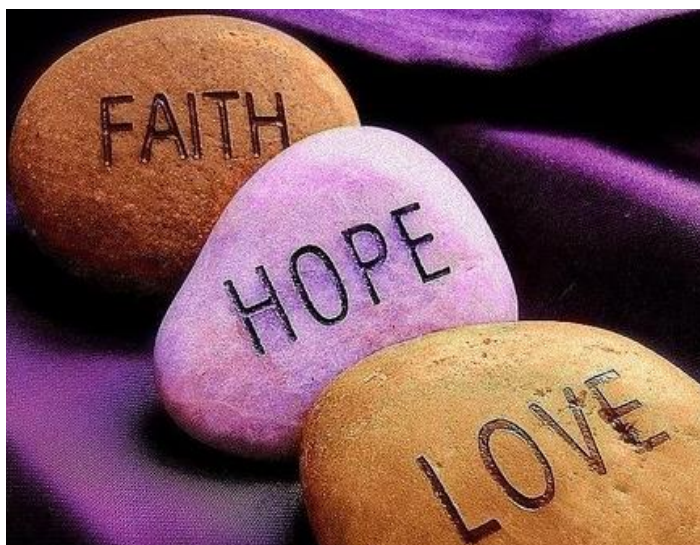
The Tree of Love and Caring/Coat and Boot Drive

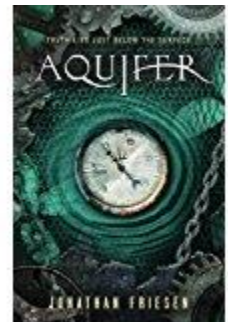
Seeking Musicians For Christmas Worship Services
