Welcome Peter Hendrickson!



Please join the PPC Book Club on Monday, October 24 as they discuss the book *All the Light We Cannot See* by Anthony Doerr. Sharon Larson will lead the discussion.

This Pulitzer Prize winning novel is about a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths collide in occupied France as both try to survive the devastation of World War II. Marie-Laure lives with her father in Paris near the Museum of Natural History, where her father works. At age six, Marie-Laure goes blind. When she is twelve, the Nazis occupy Paris and she flees with her father to the walled citadel of Saint-Malo, where her great-uncle lives in a house by the sea.

In a mining town in Germany, an orphan, Werner, becomes an expert at building and fixing crude radios, a talent that wins him a place at a brutal academy for Hitler Youth and a special assignment to track the resistance. Aware of the human cost of his intelligence, Werner travels through the heart of the war and, finally, into Saint-Malo, where his story and Marie-Laure's converge.
