Guidelines for Participation in ASC Events and Activities

Who may participate in Autism Support Center events and activities?

Participation is limited to families who are registered with us. You may register by calling the Center at 978-777-9135.

May we just show up at the activity?

All activities (except for support groups) require advance registration. You may RSVP by calling the event contact person on the flyer or the ASC general phone number: 978-777-9135. Registration will close when the event is fully subscribed, or two business days before the event. For many activities space is limited; we may keep a waitlist for certain events.

What else should we know?

Please be considerate and arrive at the designated start time for each activity.

Who can attend?

Registration for events is for your **immediate** family only: This includes the child(ren) with ASD, their siblings who live in the family home, their mother, father or guardian(s), or live-in grandparents. This does not include cousins, nieces, nephews, aunts, uncles, etc.

What is the cost?

Registration fees vary for activities and are listed on the flyers. Fees are non-refundable.

What if we change our minds?

Those who register for an event and fail to participate without notifying us will be placed on a waitlist status for three months for all activities and be allowed to participate only if there is space available. In order to allow us to fill your spot, we require notification via phone or e-mail as soon as it becomes evident that your family will be unable to attend to avoid being placed on waitlist status. Acceptable excuses for missing an activity include illness, lack of transportation and other unforeseen circumstances. Please be aware that ASC's office is closed on weekends.

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Vacations and the Downtime that Follows

School has been in session and daily routines have been established for families and their children. However everyone deserves some time off to relax, take trips, visit family and friends or the opportunity to just sleep in! The word vacation may hold a different meaning for families who have a child with a disability. For these children a change in routine may increase challenging behaviors and anxiety during the unstructured vacation time. Below is a list of suggestions to help prepare you and your family for any upcoming break from the ordinary.

- **Plan ahead!** Create a basic structure of what the vacation will entail. Whether you are planning on travelling or staying at home, having a general idea of what each day looks like will provide some structure throughout the vacation time. This will also allow you to add in some unexpected activities!
- **Consult with your BCBA** or teacher about successful strategies for flexibility and change in routine. They may be able to provide you with simple tips that will make vacation more relaxing for all.
- **If your child has a morning routine** or an evening routine stick with it throughout vacation. This provides your child with a familiar structure and will also ease the transition back to school.
- **Allow your child to make choices.** They may not know what to do with the free time or what exactly is expected of them. For example, giving them a choice between playing with their favorite puzzle, watching a movie or watching YouTube videos.
- **Utilize visual schedules!** Visualizing what is expected may reduce anxiety and anticipation of what may lie ahead. These schedules may include pictures or written activities. When making the schedule of the day, include your child in the process! This is a great way to incorporate them as well as allowing them to make

choices as to what their day will look like!

- **Calendars are a great way to visualize** upcoming vacations, holidays or any other scheduled plans. As each day passes cross off the present day and count the days left until the event.
- **Social stories!** Create a social story (or ask teacher and/or BCBA for one) about upcoming events, so you can discuss what to expect and safety rules. These stories are a fun way to inform your child of what the vacation may entail and how they will spend their time during it. These stories could be done while referencing the visual calendar.
- **Role-play and practice** during the weekends if you and your family are planning any new activity during the break. Such as, role-playing any safety concerns that may arise and including other family members into the practice. This allows all members of the family to participate and help prepare the child for twists and turns along the way. Practice makes better!
- **Try to minimize demands** that are placed on the child and increase positive reinforcement. Provide social praise, items or activities that your child enjoys for compliance (waiting/listening/etc.), acting appropriately or being flexible during the day.
- Please note that these are suggestions and are not an exhaustive list of guidelines. I hope you find some of these tips helpful. And remember enjoy your vacation! You all have worked hard and have earned some relaxation time!

In our program, young people with disabilities:

- Learn how laws are made here in Massachusetts
- Talk to lawmakers at the State House about disability rights
- Find out how students can ask for what they want at IEP and other meetings
- Practice giving speeches and trainings about rights for people with disabilities
- Learn how to work in an office setting

Our fellowship is open to people in Massachusetts, ages 18 to 26, who have autism and/or intellectual and developmental disabilities. Fellows work part time for one year, supported by a lawyer and autism information specialist from Massachusetts Advocates for Children.

Why our program works:

- It gives real-life opportunities for young people to communicate effectively about their educational experiences, lives, and goals
- When lawmakers meet young people with disabilities, they are more likely to pass laws to protect everyone's rights
- The best way to improve your life and get what you want is to learn to speak up for yourself!



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Flexible funding for low-income families



We are pleased to announce that ASC's proposal for family support flexible funding to the **Doug Flutie, Jr., Foundation for Autism** has been approved. We will begin accepting flex funding requests for Flutie funds in February. **Low income families** with a child on the autism spectrum **not** receiving funding from another source of support (for example, DDS family support, intensive supports, DESE/DDS, autism waiver, etc.) are eligible to apply. Funds can be requested for recreational activities, respite care, tuition to a social skills group, Y membership or other goods and services of direct benefit to the child with ASD.

The Doug Flutie Jr. Foundation awards grants on an annual basis to non-profit organizations and schools that provide services, education and advocacy for children with autism spectrum disorder and to organizations that conduct research on the causes and effects of autism. Over \$402,000 was distributed to organizations all over the US and Canada

We are very grateful to the Flutie Foundation for their continued support of the families we serve!

HOLLAND PROJECT

Barn Program for Teens with Autism and Other Developmental Delays

An integrated farming and agricultural Saturday program for teens diagnosed with autism and other developmental delays. The program is designed for the teens to have a typically developing volunteer from the community to assist them. Each program participant will experience the many educational, therapeutic, vocational and social benefits of working on a farm with a peer and caring for the animals on a farm setting.

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Transition Talk



Who is eligible for a 688 referral (turning 22 law)?

Persons who are automatically eligible for Chapter 688 include:

- Anyone receiving SSI and/or SSDI based on his/her own disability or;
- Anyone listed in the registry of the Massachusetts Commission for the Blind

All young adults referred to Chapter 688 must be:

- Receiving special education services in Massachusetts paid for by the school district (LEA) and
- In need of continuing services because of the severity of their disability and
- Unable to work 20 or more hours per week in competitive employment




