The Many Roles of the BCBA

ABA home services help individuals with autism and developmental disorders access the things in their environments in different ways. Home services are supervised by a BCBA and treatment plans are implemented by a direct care provider. BCBA's hold many different roles during the treatment process, and below you will find an outline of the major clinical responsibilities a BCBA carries to ensure appropriate and effective services.

Common Roles of a BCBA

BCBAs conduct assessments: BCBA's have various methods of conducting assessments and conduct evaluations on challenging behaviors, skills that need to be acquired, and preferences of the individual. A BCBA's initial job during the intake process is to conduct assessments, observe the client and take data on behaviors to determine any behavioral excesses (behaviors happening too much) or deficits (behaviors happening too little) the individual has. Functional assessments are often done to determine the function or the reason a behavior(s) is occurring. Testing such as the ABLLS or the Vineland may be used to assess which functional skills need to be taught to that client. Preference assessments help determine what the client finds motivating and can be used to reinforce desired behaviors during treatment. The data collected by the BCBA at the initial assessment is crucial in determining what goals will be set for the client and which skills will be targeted first. BCBA's continue to perform assessment at various times throughout the treatment period to determine growth and skills acquisition as well as future goals that will need to be addressed.

BCBAs create protocols and programming: After data is gathered from the initial assessment, a treatment plan is drafted by the BCBA that includes background and relevant social information about the client, what behaviors will be targeted for reduction, and what functional and appropriate skills will be targeted for increase. Challenging yet attainable goals are determined by the BCBA and a mastery criteria is set for each of those goals so that progress may be measured across the treatment period. The BCBA then creates a behavior intervention plan or BIP. The BIP outlines the exact protocols, based on the functions or causes of that behavior that should be implemented for each particular behavior that is being targeted. The BCBA will determine based on their assessment of the client's behavior what intervention techniques they think will be most effective at creating lasting behavioral change for that particular client. Skills acquisition programming is also developed by the BCBA to target and teach more functional and appropriate alternative behaviors and replacement skills.



Northeast Arc Offers Unique Residential Opportunity

Three New Housing Units

Opening in the winter of 2017

Northeast Arc Residential Services is renovating a beautiful 150 year old, single family home, into three separate apartment units. Each unit has two bedrooms with spacious new kitchens; separate dining area and large living rooms .The first floor 2 bedroom unit is designed to assist persons with mobility issues, with a ramp to the back entrance, wheel chair accessible bathroom and showers and washer and dryer in this unit. We have a washer and dryer for units 2 and 3 on the premises and off street parking and large backyard perfect for barbeques and outdoor entertaining.

This innovative housing development is geared to support young adults on the autism spectrum or adults with mild intellectual disabilities who are interested in self-determination and living in a supported independent living arrangement. The building is situated in the town of Salem, Massachusetts, within walking distance to Salem State University, bus and train lines, stores and restaurants and the beach.

We maintain close relationships with our neighbors and especially Salem State Alumni who have adopted this home. In the past, they have established relationships with the residents, sharing dinners, volunteering their time and talent to design flower beds, and completing fall and spring yard work projects. The Salem Alumni group has also donated tickets to the university's sporting events and theatre productions and has generously agreed to continue their work with the residents. The Mayor of Salem, Kim Driscoll, has also lent her support

and endorsement of the new project.

We will be working closely with the Salem Housing Authority and individual participants to secure section 8 subsidies or rental vouchers for those adults who are income eligible. The house already has two facility based rental subsidies which would be applied to the first 2 eligible participants.



We will provide a framework of support that encourages family participation, develops community connections, focuses on health and teaches life skills to young adults who are able to live successfully in their own apartments with some onsite education and skills building. We incorporate the latest technology or make recommendations for software that facilitates personal growth and development.

We conduct an extensive intake and referral process for interested applicants by reviewing clinical/ educational documents provided by a family member or a referring agency.

The support team will include life skills coaches, case managers, a resident aide, and on site consultation from clinicians as needed.



Adult Family Care--AFC
Are you eligible?

Providing live-in care for a friend or loved one isn't always easy, but Adult Family Care (AFC) is a MassHealth funded program that can help. AFC supports and financially assists live-in caregivers for those who are unable to live alone and are eligible for MassHealth. Also known as Adult Foster Care, AFC supports caregivers with compensation, guidance and paid time off. Along with a tax-free stipend for the caregiver, ongoing training and support from a nurse and a social worker are part of the service.

To be eligible, you have to have MassHealth Standard or Commonwealth Health and be at least 16 years old. Most importantly, you must have a physical, medical, or developmental disability and need supervision or assistance with at least one basic task of everyday life. BCBA ROLES (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

BCBAs observe and take data on behaviors: Over the course of the treatment period a BCBA's role will include monitoring the client's progress, including regular observations of the client's behavior, data collection and analysis of the data to determine the strengthening or reduction of the particular behaviors being targeted. The BCBA may conduct observations and collect data in a variety of settings, with different people, or at different times of the day to ensure that interventions and programming are generalizing outside of the regularly scheduled session times. Data collection and analysis is essential in determining the efficacy of the treatment plan that has been put into place, and the BCBA may make adjustments to protocols as needed to better treat the client.

BCBAs supervise direct staff and provide training: While the BCBA conducts assessment, observes, takes and analyzes data and develops protocols and programming for behaviors, a direct care provider implements all of those strategies and protocols. It is a role of the BCBA to supervise this implementation by the direct care provider to ensure that all data being taken and all interventions being run are both valid and reliable. BCBAs provide the direct care provider with the tools to help the client, and give training and support to the providers on a regular basis to ensure quality services.

BCBAs provide clinical support to families: It is not just the role of the BCBA to provide his or her initial clinical interpretations and intervention suggestions for the client, but to also provide clinical support to the entire family. BCBAs hold regular clinical meetings and trainings for family members to discuss progress and train family members on specific interventions. BCBA's may attend IEP meetings to ensure carry over of strategies and assess whether skills being taught in the home are generalizing to the school setting. BCBAs also regularly coordinate with outside service agencies such as speech therapy, occupational therapy and/or physical therapy to ensure reasonable and appropriate interventions are being used across sessions. Consistency across settings and people increases the likelihood that the behavioral strategies being implemented will have a greater impact on the behaviors they are targeting, and it is part of the BCBA's role to be involved in the generalization of skills across all environments.



Flexible funding for low-income families



We are pleased to announce that ASC's proposal for family support flexible funding to the **Doug Flutie, Jr., Foundation for Autism** has been approved. We will begin accepting flex funding requests for Flutie funds in February. **Low income families** with a child on the autism spectrum **not** receiving funding from another source of support (for example, DDS family support, intensive supports, DESE/ DDS, autism waiver, etc.) are eligible to apply. Funds can be requested for recreational activities, respite care, tuition to a social skills group, Y membership or other goods and services of direct benefit to the child with ASD.

The Doug Flutie Jr. Foundation awards grants on an annual basis to non-profit organizations and schools that provide services, education and advocacy for children with autism spectrum disorder and to organizations that conduct research on the causes and effects of autism. Over \$402,000 was distributed to organizations all over the US and Canada

Fred R. Volkmar, M.D., is one of the most prominent researchers in the field of autism. He is Irving B. Harris Professor of Child Psychiatry, Pediatrics, and Psychology at the Yale University Child Study Center, School of Medicine. Beginning in the 1970's research began to show that structured educational interventions were most effective in producing developmental change in children with autism. Since that time a large body of work has accumulated with a number of evidence based approaches now available. This presentation will summarize this work and the changes in outcome that appear to be associated with it. Needs of adolescents and young adults with autism will be summarized.


