With its collection of 23 million items, Bates Hall, Chevannes Gallery, The Abbey Room, The John Singer Sargent Gallery, The Adams Collection, and Shakespeare collection, the BPL holds the third largest collection of items after the Library of Congress and the NY Public Library..

From the Collections: a Tour of the Boston Athenaeum

Founded in 1807 by members of the Anthology Society, basing their vision on the Athenaeum and Lyceum in Liverpool, England, it is one of the oldest independent and membership libraries in the US. With a major renovation completed in 2002, the Athenaeum houses over 600,000 volumes and many important special collections.

Tours will be led by Scott Guthery, a Proprietor of the Athenaeum and past Ticknor Society President, who will show some of the Athenaeum's movable book collection.

RISD is a fine arts and design college founded in 1877. Their exhibit in the Fleet Library will be arranged by types of movable books: 2D, volvelles, flaps, 1 piece pop-ups, spirals, layered pop-ups and bindings: accordions, flags, tunnels and more. It encompasses a range of historical works to contemporary books. Hours during the conference are Monday – Thursday 8:30-11PM, Friday, 8:30-8PM, Saturday 11-6PM, and Sunday 12-11PM. Special Collection hours are Monday-Friday 8:30-4:30 PM.

American Antiquarian Society – www.americanantiquarian.org

Founded in 1812 by Revolutionary War patriot and printer Isaiah Thomas, the AAS is both a learned society and a major independent research library. It houses the largest and most accessible collection of books, pamphlets, broadsides, newspapers, periodicals, music and graphic arts material printed through 1876. Their curator of graphic arts (Lauren Hewes) has a handful of Instagram posts queued up for the conference, each showing one of the “movable books” IN MOTION!! They will start appearing about a week before the conference, so we encourage everyone at the conference to follow them.

(Note: Their collections include metamorphic trade cards, Tinker Mardi Gras invitations, pop-up vinegar Valentines, three-dimensional Valentine shadow boxes, Valentines with lift flaps, games, paper furniture, paper dolls that involve manipulated paper pieces, plus a how-to book for making toys out of paper: DC Johnston collection, “paper toys for adults”.

Houghton Library, Harvard University

The emphasis is on the centrality of books to monastic life. Male and female monasticism revolved around religion, but at its heart was a cult of the book: not just the bible, all books. Monastic scriptoria guaranteed the survival and transmission of classical literature and learning. Reverence felt for texts and their authors is manifest in the beauty of the books that were crafted in monasteries and convents. Manuscripts on display at the Houghton Library highlight the scriptorium as both a space for the production of manuscripts and the human collective that produced them.
