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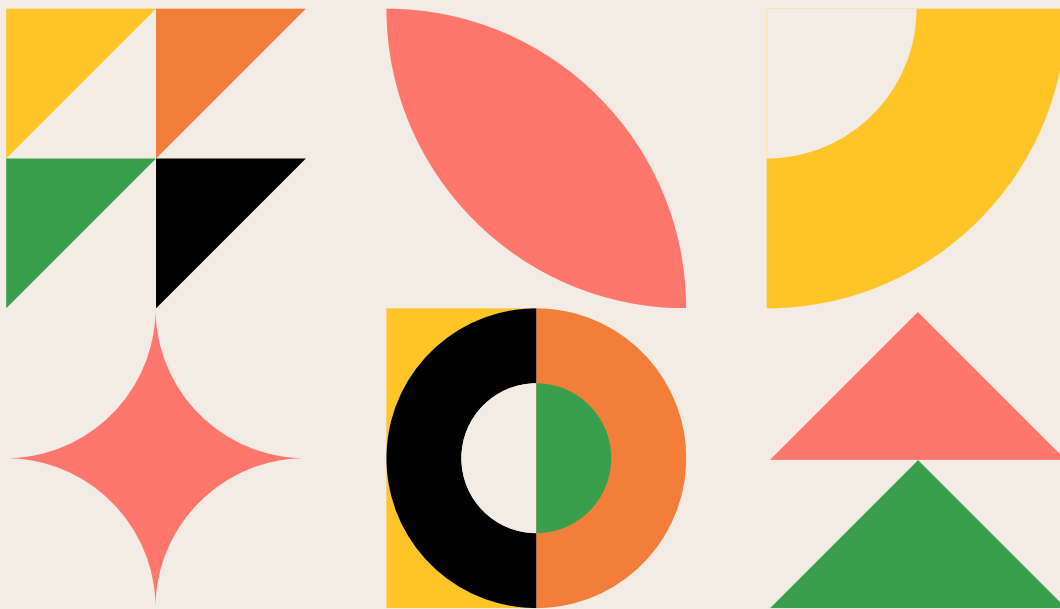
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OVERVIEW

All sessions are held on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

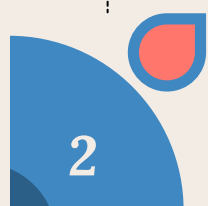

Mixed Media & Film Photography

November 28 — December 21, 2023 | 3:30 pm - 5:30 pm

This session will explore analog and alternative process photography. Students will learn the basics of photo composition through film photography such as hand coloring, cyanotype printing, and photo storytelling through different mediums.

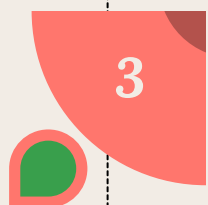

Digital Photography Techniques

January 16 — February 15, 2024 | 4:30 pm - 6:30 pm

This session will practice the mechanics and aesthetics of photography. Students will learn studio techniques including photographic processes, and principles. Students will become visually literate, and help students to develop a personal photographic style.

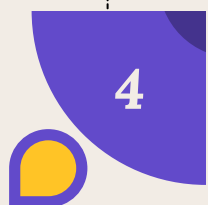

Poetry

February 20 — March 7, 2024 | 3:30 pm - 5:30 pm

The session will focus on the process of creative writing, and poetry. Students will learn creative writing approaches, techniques, poetic conventions, and styles. This session may support students enrolled in the Yolo County Poetry Out Loud Competition.

3D Mixed Media

March 19 — April 25, 2024 | 3:30 pm - 5:30 pm

The session will be based on 3D mediums that allow students to express their heritage. Students will learn how to build mini structures and homes with a variety of materials and integrate the process of cultural, community, and personal storytelling.

Mural Project | May 28 — June 20, 2024 | 3:30 pm - 5:30 pm

In this session, students will demonstrate collaboration, creativity, and originality in YoloArts' fifth annual Yolo County High School Mural. Students will design and fabricate a mural to be installed at the Gibson House and Property in Woodland, CA. This mural will be temporary and will be on view for a period of 1 year. The 23-24 Mural Project is funded by a generous donation from the Voss Family Trust.

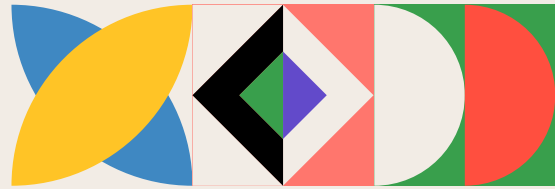


Tomás Montoya is a multidisciplinary artist and community worker. In 2015 Tomás received his Bachelor of Science degree in Digital Film and Video Production from The Art Institute of Sacramento. Soon after, Tomás opened a video production company (SacCentric Productions) which focuses on creating promotional material for independent artists and community-based organizations throughout California. Since 2015, Tomás has been the Lead Teaching Artist for the Juvenile Justice Arts Education Program. The Program serves youth incarcerated and on probation. Youth receive instruction in visual, performing, and literary arts that enable them to creatively express their personal voice.



Giana Galati has a background in many art forms but has primarily worked with metal for the past seven years. An apprenticeship under a fellow metalworker led to a continued education at American River and Sacramento City Colleges and evolved into a jewelry line, Vivid Venus as well as constructing metalwork sculptures. Scholarship Review Criteria

Scholarships are granted based on the following:

Applications will be reviewed by the YoloArts education department and will be reviewed based on the following review criteria:

- Creative Vision: The artist effectively communicates a story or message and aspirations through their work.
- Creative Expression: The artist effectively expresses themes including but not limited to culture, ethnicity, identity, nature, emotions, and aspirations.
- Financial Need: Demonstrate financial need by completing the financial assistance section on the application.

To apply visit www.yoloarts.org/yas and submit at least ONE independently created visual, performing, or literary work sample. You can upload multiple mediums and mix and match work samples.

Writing samples: Maximum of 1 page. Examples: short stories, scripts, poetry, etc.

Images and Renderings: Maximum of 3 images.

Video and Audio: Up to 3 minutes in length total. Upload a link to your video on YouTube. Please ensure it is "Unlisted" and non-password protected.
