Academic Field Day

Wednesday marked another year for HHS's spring tradition of Academic Field Day. From early morning until lunch, students exercised their minds and body in three different 50 minute activities. Over 35 choices were offered, including fashion, weight lifting, meditation and calmness with sand coloring, origami, mind games beyond Wordle, safe international travel, coding, great NY sport moments, film genres, history through musicals, riffing (improvisation), global state of affairs, history of the Burke Estate, country music, jewelry making, improv theater and the art/science of rare coins. And, when the twenty-or-so seniors received their traditional final concert rose, the entire gathering was one, united through music for each of these students, who largely have been together since their early elementary years.
