
Colleen Jones - 2nd Grade Special Education Teacher (Hillside)

Ms. Puglise spent a semester at Newcastle University in the United Kingdom where she wrote an Immersion Project about social justice.

Jennifer Lynch has a dual master's degree in Inclusive Special Education and History from Hofstra University. She is a Board Certified Behavior Analyst and Licensed Behavior Analyst in New York State. She has experience teaching in self-contained and general education classrooms and helping districts build ABA programs to ensure all students can have the opportunities to remain in their home community districts.

Jennifer has worked in the district for six years. She provides ongoing consultation to teachers, teacher aides, related service providers, and families to assess needs and create support to enable individuals with challenging behaviors to be successful throughout the school day. Inclusion Facilitator:

We are thrilled to be entering our 2nd year with Kristen Kumar as our Inclusion Facilitator. In the new year, Mrs. Kumar, Mr. Stewart, and Mrs. Sullivan will be working with stakeholders K-12 to evaluate the current status of Special Education in Hastings and develop goals for enhancing our program. Our committee will begin internally; however, we will eventually expand to include community members.











Crisis Prevention Intervention:

Laura Sullivan and Tesfa Stewart are both Certified Crisis Prevention Intervention Instructors - Associates through Nonviolent Crisis Intervention*. "CPI training equips you with skills, confidence, and an effective framework to safely manage & prevent difficult behavior. From children to teens to adults, Nonviolent Crisis Intervention* training helps de-escalate tense situations with people of all ages." In December, we successfully trained 36 staff members to be fully trained in verbal, non-verbal, and physical de-escalation strategies. Moving forward, we will be working with each building to design crisis teams to help support students and staff who require these techniques and interventions.

Wilson Language Training:

Across three buildings, four special education teachers, Emily Isidori, Donna Gamble, Britney Skultety, and Erin Dolan, are going through the practicum to become certified Wilson Trainers. Teachers were able to go to a three-day training during the summer in order to prepare for this practicum. Teachers are working one on one with students before or after school for this certification. In addition, there are 95 hours of coursework to support teachers in learning new strategies to support all learners. Teachers have reported that they are excited for this opportunity to continue to grow so that all students can continue to be successful in our buildings.

District Leadership PLC:

Since September, one of the focal points of our district leadership professional learning community has been to broaden our knowledge on the CSE process, roles and responsibilities, and best practices on how to best support students with disabilities within our district. Our district leaders have actively taken part in 3 sessions of ongoing work, which will continue throughout the 21-22 school year to ensure strong services for all students K-12.

Winward institute:

Erin Dolan participated over summer in an overview course through the Windward Institute. The Multisensory Reading Instruction: PAF (Preventing Academic Failure) Reading Program is organized in two four-session courses, emphasizing explicit, multisensory techniques for teaching reading, handwriting, and spelling in the primary grades. PAF incorporates the theories and practices of Orton-Gilllingham instruction into an early intervention program intended for children at-risk for reading difficulties. PAF can also be used remedially for struggling readers or as an effective beginning reading program for all children. Topics will include instructional practices supported by the latest research on developing accurate and fluent reading and comprehension, lesson planning, and curriculum-based assessments.

In the month of January and February, Ms. Ippolito attended The Windward Multisensory Reading Instruction PAF Reading Program. This program was organized in two four-session courses, emphasizing explicit, multisensory techniques for teaching reading, handwriting, and spelling in the primary grades. Topics included instructional practices supported by the latest research on developing accurate and fluent reading and comprehension, lesson planning, and curriculum-based assessments.
