Maurice L. Harris Announces Departure from Diocesan Communications Minister Role

Dear People of The Episcopal Church in Vermont,

Please join me in thanking Dr. Maurice L. Harris for his service over the past three-and-a-half years and wishing him well on the next chapter of his journey. Maurice has served as our full-time communications minister since 2016 and as a volunteer co-facilitator of the diocese's racial reconciliation and racial healing network since 2017. He recently accepted a new job opportunity in Connecticut and will be relocating there with his husband, Might, in early January.

Although I am sad to see the Harrises leave Vermont, Maurice and I have spent some time discussing how we might leverage his transition to expand the ministry of The Episcopal Church in Vermont in new and creative ways while maintaining the high-quality newsletter, social media channels, web content, and media relations that have enhanced our fellowship within the church and our evangelism in the wider community. Part of this strategic vision includes creating a dedicated Ministry Support Team resource for racial reconciliation, as well as other sites of cultural transformation to which our diocese has been committed.

To that end, I have asked Canticle Communications to begin working with us on communications and advancement. Canticle is a firm, founded in 2009, that works primarily in The Episcopal Church helping dioceses and other church institutions with strategic communications. Some of you may know Canticle's partners, Jim Naughton and Rebecca Wilson, from their consulting with The Episcopal Church in Vermont in 2013, and may also know that our own Kathleen Moore, transitional deacon from St. James, Arlington and former communications minister, is Canticle's communications manager. In working with Canticle, we will have the benefit of both churchwide experience and deep knowledge of our context here in Vermont. Canticle is already working with Maurice to ensure a smooth transition.

Early this year, I will be working with selected diocesan leaders to continue the work in racial reconciliation and racial healing by creating a leadership framework for cultural transformation. You can expect to hear more from me about that process as it unfolds.

As we bid farewell to Maurice, I give thanks for his ministry and for God's abundance, which is drawing us into ever more faithful ways of joining God's mission. Thank you for your participation in our shared ministry.

Support Available for Vermonters to Attend Evangelism Matters Conference in Atlanta January 21-24, 2020

The next Evangelism Matters Conference offered by the Episcopal Church's Evangelism Initiative will be held Tuesday-Friday, Jan. 21-24, in Atlanta, GA. This gathering, which will feature a Q&A with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, will occur in tandem with the larger and multi-faceted Rooted in Jesus conference, which itself has an Evangelism Track.

Financial support is available for a few Vermont Episcopalians to attend the conference, which promises to be inspirational and educational for those committed to sharing the good news of Christ with others. Recall that The Episcopal Church understands evangelism to be "the spiritual practice of seeking, naming and celebrating Jesus' loving presence in the stories of all people, and then inviting everyone to more." In addition to the Presiding Bishop, the Evangelism Matters Pre-Conference will feature Canon Stephanie Spellers, who spoke at the 2018 Vermont Diocesan Convention; Evangelism Staff Officer Jerusalem Greer; and Bill Boyce of the Diocese of Massachusetts, among others. The pre-conference runs Tuesday and Wednesday, with the Rooted in Jesus conference running from Wednesday evening until Friday 2 p.m. The Evangelism Track within the main conference has very substantial offerings, so if one's time is limited, it would be very worthwhile for

Vermont evangelists to attend Rooted in Jesus alone, Wednesday-Friday. However, one cannot register for the Tuesday-Wednesday pre-conference without also registering for the main conference.

Green Mountain Witness, the evangelism initiative of the Diocese of Vermont, was greatly energized by team members attending the Evangelism Matters conference held in Cleveland in March 2018, so we as a team highly recommend this 2020 conference to Vermonters who can attend. Green Mountain Witness received a grant from the churchwide initiative that has helped fund the diocesan work since then, and assistance for attending the 2020 conference will be from that fund. News in Pictures: After Six Years of Silence, St. Luke's Rings in the New Year with Functioning Bells

The holidays seemed somehow incomplete without the familiar sound of bells from Advent through Christmas and into the New Year. For six years the town of St. Albans inhabited a silence that longed to be filled with the melodious chimes of St. Luke's Episcopal Church—an impossibility since pigeons had taken over the bell tower and damaged the electronic chime system. Then as 2019 drew to a close, parishioners played the role of Christmas angels, implementing necessary repairs and installing deterrents to keep the birds out. By year's end the bells were once again heralding God's love throughout the town.


The decision to invest resources into the repair of the chime system was due in part to its fascinating history. When the church building was constructed in 1861 it was outfitted with a single bell and manual ringer, typical of churches at that time. In 1924, the Bostwick family championed the installation of a multi-chime system enabling songs to be played by a bell choir. Thus, the single bell was traded at Meneely Bell Company in New York City for credit toward a 10-bell chime system as documented in photos 1 and 2.

The West Side Structural Company of Troy New York was hired to install a spiral staircase in the bell tower to reach the chime system as shown in photo 3. Each bell in the chime system was dedicated to a saint and to the memory of past church members as documented on the next page in photo 4.

In 1967, the people of St. Luke's commissioned the Verdin Bell Company of Cincinnati, Ohio and Church Specialties of Poultney, Vermont to electrify the chime system (photo 5) so that the entire mechanism could be played by a keyboardist rather than a bell choir. Ten years ago, the system was again upgraded to read digital files from a computer system designed by Chime Master of Lancaster, Ohio. Unfortunately, when pigeons tore through the protective mesh over the bell tower openings (see photo 6) and damaged components inside the chime system the bells fell silent six years ago.

From August to September 2019, David Dupont and Rick Hamilton evicted pigeons and repaired the bell tower openings (photos 7 and 8). From October to December, Chris Kenyon, a veteran U. S. Navy electronics expert and long time St. Luke's member, made electrical repairs. Now restored to their former glory, the bells at St. Luke's are enjoyed by churchgoers and the wider community. In photo 9, Rick tours the bell tower with his daughter, Kate.



VT Care Partners Invites Faith Communities to Annual Health Equity Conference, March 13

BURLINGTON, VT - Vermont Care Partners (VCP) will be hosting an annual health equity event on March 13 at the University of Vermont Davis Center in Burlington. VCP is a trade organization and advocacy group that supports 16 designated and special service agencies in Vermont for individuals with mental health conditions, substance use disorders, and intellectual and developmental disabilities.

For the past the years, the VCP conference has addressed the need to promote health equity and cultural and linguistic competence among providers and community members. Last year nearly 400 people gathered to hear speakers from around country and expand their network. This year's event is geared toward the following goals:

1. Expanding participant knowledge and understanding of the impact of racism, sexism, classism, ableism, and cultural blindness on health equity and cultural competence
2. Promoting innovative practices and approaches that increase the inclusion of all people in the broader healthcare system
3. Increasing participant knowledge of peer-driven programs and approaches that promote inclusion
4. Expanding participant understanding of community members and organizations that also promote health equity and wellness
5. Increasing participant knowledge about the intersection between the policy initiatives and community practices that promote inclusion and cultural competence

To address the role of faith based organizations in the promotion of health equity, VCP has invited Sydney Hankerson, MD, from Columbia University to lead a three-hour workshop on working collaboratively with faith organizations and leaders to promote equitable access to care. Additionally, Vivian Jackson, PhD, from Georgetown will deliver a keynote address and lead a workshop on cultural and linguistic competency. Maria Mercedes Avila, PhD, will moderate a panel discussion and film screening about cultural and linguistic competence.


