The Cathedral Church of St. Paul Announces the Formal Seating of the New Bishop

BURLINGTON, VT - On Sunday, September 29, the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Burlington will host the Formal Seating of the 11th Bishop of Vermont. Not to be confused with the Consecration held the day before, the Seating is a traditional ceremony that recognizes and invests a newly ordained and consecrated bishop.

At the Seating service, the new bishop will petition for recognition and investiture. A representative of the diocese will testify that the new bishop was duly elected and that consents to the election were received. The people will then recognize and receive the new bishop, promising to uphold the new bishop in this ministry. The new bishop will also take her place in the cathedra, or bishop's chair, a symbol of the bishop's office.

The Seating will be streamed live!

The Seating service will be streamed live on YouTube beginning at 10 a.m. A link to the live stream is available at https://diovermont.org/ bishop-transition/. A larger than usual turnout is expected for this public service; overflow seating will be provided available in the Cathedral's lower level where participants will be able to view the livestream and participate in the Communion.

The guest preacher at the Seating service will be the Very Rev. Miguelina Howell, dean of Christ Church Cathedral in Hartford, Conn. The Very Rev. Howell was ordained in 2002 in the Episcopal Diocese of the Dominican Republic. She is a member of the Episcopal Church Latino/Hispanic Ministries Council of Advice, as well as the Board of the Society for the Increase of Ministry, and was appointed to the General Convention 2015 Task Force on Sustainability and Development of Latino/Hispanic Ministries. The Very Rev. Howell is also as a faculty member of CREDO, a wellness program of the Church Pension Group.

Rock Point Commons Welcomes First-ever Executive Director

BURLINGTON. VT - The board of directors of Rock Point is pleased to announce that the Rev. Paul Habersang has accepted the position of executive director, Rock Point Commons. Paul will be the first person to serve in this newly created role, which will take effect on October 1, 2019.

The Rev. Habersang brings to the executive director role a wide range of experiences in for-profit and not-for-profit sectors. His background includes sales and marketing positions at General Electric, Schneider Electric, and Morris Controls, as well as ministerial positions at Hartford Hospital, parishes within the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut, and in his current role as priest in partnership at Christ Church, Montpelier.

In a letter to the people of Christ Church, the Rev. Habersang wrote, "I am humbled, honored, and pleased to have been called to this position whose primary responsibilities will include the ongoing development of Rock Point Commons into a self-sustaining ministry of the Episcopal Church in Vermont."

Rock Point Board member David McKay, who helped lead the executive director search process, commented, "Paul's appointment marks an important milestone in the history of Rock Point Commons. On behalf of the Rock Point Board I can say that we are confident that Paul has the unique gifts-skills, experience, and ingenuity-to lead Rock Point Commons into the future."

The Rev. Habersang's final Sunday with Christ Church will be October 27. From that date, the Montpelier congregation will continue celebrating weekly Eucharist with supply clergy until a new interim clergy person is selected.

Regarding the transition process, the Rev. Habersang said, "I am confident that Christ Church has a very bright future. God's Spirit has set each of our hearts on fire, and that is a flame that cannot be quenched."

The Williamstown, Vermont resident holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Management from Quinnipiac University and a Master of Divinity degree from the General Theological Seminary. He is also an alumnus of the Clergy Leadership Project at Trinity Wall Street in New York City and serves as board secretary for Brookhaven Treatment & Learning Center.

St. Thomas & Grace Welcomes New Priest in Partnership

BRANDON, VT – The Rev. Rachel Field joined St. Thomas and Grace Episcopal Church as priest in partnership on August 29. The position is a quarter-time role, an arrangement that will enable the Rev. Field to pursue her call as both a sacramental minister and an environmental educator and activist. The Rev. Field is part

of the parish's Core Ministry Team, the group charged by the parish's leadership to address the spiritual needs of the parish. She is in Brandon for Sunday worship two or three times each month; on other Sundays, worship is led by visiting priests or lay people. The Rev. Field is also in Brandon at other times to attend meetings and build relationships with people in the parish and the community.

Prior to moving to Vermont last summer, the Rev. Field worked for the Episcopal Church in Connecticut as one of six regional missionaries who support the spiritual development and missions of parishes and lay leaders.

Rena McDonough, senior warden, commented, "We are excited by the gifts and talents that Rachel brings to St. Thomas & Grace. She has a quiet spirituality, sense of humor, passion for the environment and nature, and energy. She has experience helping groups figure out how to be church in the twenty-first century.

The Rev. Field grew up as an Episcopalian. She graduated from Washington College in Maryland with a bachelor's degree in Environmental Studies, worked as an ornithologist for a migratory bird banding station, and went to Yale Divinity School. She was ordained as a priest in 2016.

The Rev. Field commented, "I am drawn to St. Thomas & Grace partly because of the congregation's strong environmental ethic – the garden, composting, recycling, reusing. I am also excited by their vision of being in partnership with a priest, which conveys a sense of shared ministry and ministry that goes beyond the more traditional 'priest in charge' model."

ARLINGTON, VT - On Sunday, September 15, the parish of St. James' Episcopal Church in Arlington celebrated the new ministry of the Rev. Mary Robinson White as its priest in partnership.

A native of Arizona, the Rev. White graduated from the University of Arizona with a B.A. in Elementary Education. She taught school for more than 10 years before deciding to pursue the ministry. She graduated from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific and then served in parishes in Arizona and California. Her most recent parish was St. Andrew's in Albany, NY, where she had been since 2002. The Rev. White holds a certificate in Congregational Development from Seabury Western Theological Seminary, as well as a certificate of Spiritual Direction from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany.

She and her husband, John, who have three grown children, will divide their time between the St. James' Rectory and their home in Albany. For hobbies, the Rev. White plays the bagpipes and enjoys cross-country skiing.

Interfaith CROP Hunger Walks Are Stepping Up to End Hunger in Vermont This October

Celebrating the 50th anniversary of the national CROP Hunger Walk movement, CROP Hunger Walks continue to raise millions of dollars each year to help end hunger and poverty through long-term sustainable approaches to significantly reduce or eliminate hunger. In each CROP Hunger Walk community, 25% of money raised comes back to local agencies. Across the country, over 1,600 local agencies receive funds from CROP Hunger Walks.

This year some 800 communities nationwide, and five here in Vermont, are joining together in interfaith CROP Hunger Walks around the theme "Stepping up to End Hunger Since 1969." The CROP Hunger Walk was started in 1969 by a group of energized young people in Bismarck, North Dakota who wanted to mobilize their community to fight global hunger. Today, the CROP Hunger Walk is a national movement raising funds for the global hunger-fighting work of Church World Service and local hunger-fighting agencies. Last year, over 800 events raised over \$8 million dollars.
