

A Letter from The Rev. Deacon Rachel Iversen

Hello Good People of Christ Church!

I am The Rev. Deacon Rachel Iversen and will be with you as your deacon for at least the next six months. I am fortunate to already know some of you from my recent seminary internship with the Central Gulf Coast CDF Freedom School and my tenure as your Interim Youth Director during your national search. I am looking forward to getting to know each one of you better, but first I wanted to let you know a little bit about me.

My husband Craig and I have been married for twenty-eight years. We have three children: Mary Catherine (23), Philip (21), and Chris (16). Our daughter lives and works in Missoula, Montana in the Bitterroot Forest. Our son, Philip is a senior at UWF majoring in Marine Science. Our son, Chris is a junior at Washington High School. Craig works for the Florida Forest Service and is stationed at Blackwater.

I am a “cradle Episcopalian,” Army brat born in Oklahoma and raised in Florida. I attended Ferry Pass Middle and Woodham High. My dad worked as a computer programmer at Cape Canaveral while earning his masters in accounting and my mom was a “Stay-at-Home” mom, Girl Scout Leader and later after earning her degree became a Nursing Home Administrator. My parents' family were Protestants in the Methodist and Baptist denominations. Before my dad was deployed to Korea, they were married in the Episcopal Church in Birmingham.
