

DONALD AND BARBARA ZUCKER SCHOOL of MEDICINE AT HOFSTRA/NORTHWELL

The Humanities in Medicine program of the Donald and Barbara Zucker School of Medicine at Hofstra/Northwell houses the Osler Society, a forum dedicated to pursuing the humanities among health care professionals. The forum is named after Sir William Osler (1849-1919), who recognized that "[t]he Humanities bring the student into contact with the master minds" – the world's great thinkers. Sir William Osler argued that "infecting the average man with the spirit of the Humanities is the greatest single gift in education," emphasizing the importance that the humanities remain a critical part of the education of all those who treat patients.

In precisely this spirit, we have created a program designed to engage health professionals in the humanities by featuring and encouraging the arts, including literature, poetry, music, film, theater, paintings, sculpture, photography, and the history of medicine. Merging medicine and the arts, Osler Society programming teaches health care professionals to look at medicine and our patients through a creative lens.

UNDERSTANDING POSTPARTUM DEPRESSION




