Thirty-five percent of the pedestrians killed in crashes had BACs of .08 or higher. To make sure everyone has a safe and enjoyable holiday, the California Office of Traffic Safety offers tips on getting home safely after the celebrations are over.

Plan ahead, designate a sober driver: If you plan to consume alcohol, make it a point to designate a sober driver before the party begins. Waiting until you've been drinking to make this decision increase your chances of poor judgment, resulting in potentially regrettable decisions.

Pedestrians are at risk too: Pub crawlers, if walking after a night of drinking, make sure to have a sober friend with you to help keep an eye out for cars. Be alert always and obey all street signs and signals. Jay-staggering is neither cool nor safe.
