Below are updates from the Mayor's office.

Key updates

COVID #s: From yesterday's release from the County Department of Public Health: 408 new cases in the county. There have been a total of 84,876 positives in West Valley communities, an increase of 252 confirmed cases since April 18th.

City sites are prepared to administer close to 150,000 first and second doses of COVID-19 vaccines this week, an increase in capacity following the federal guidance ending the pause of Johnson & Johnson. The program will add another fixed location to offer vaccinations in Century City.

This week, the City is expected to receive nearly 42,000 doses of the Moderna vaccine and over 63,000 of Pfizer, along with about 29,000 doses of Johnson & Johnson already in its supply.

This week, fixed city vaccination sites will be open Tuesday through Saturday, with the exception of Dodger Stadium, which will be closed on Wednesday to accommodate a scheduled Dodger game. Angelenos can make first dose appointments online at the City's vaccination portal, which is updated weekly at Coronavirus.LACity.org/VaxAppointment.

Since launching a COVID-19 vaccination program in December, the City has administered over 1,137,829 doses to Angelenos, approximately 96% of its supply.

55-Hour, Extended Closure of US Rte 101 Planned as Sixth Street Viaduct Arches Go Up Over Freeway

The closure begins on Friday. April 30th at 10 p.m. and extends through Monday May 3rd at 5 a.m.

The closure will center around the east side of the viaduct construction site in Boyle Heights, closing a 2.5-mile section of US Rte 101 from the 10/101 split to the 5/10/101 interchange just east of downtown Los Angeles. In addition, motorists traveling west on Rte 60 from the Pomona area will not be able to access US Rte 101.

The City's <u>Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP)</u> administered by the Housing & Community Investment Department (HCID), ERAP provides federal and state emergency rental assistance funds to assist low-income renters who have been unable to pay their rent due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Both landlords and low-income renters living in the City of Los Angeles may apply, *regardless of immigration status*. The deadline to apply is 11:59pm on April 30, 2021. Applications are available in multiple languages at hcidla.lacity.org. The program is required to give priority to paying past-due, unpaid rent. If selected, the program can pay 80% of a tenant's past-due rent for the period of April 1, 2020, through March 31, 2021, but only if the landlord agrees to waive the remaining 20%.
